DEPARTMENT'S RECOMMENDED ACTION: Give permission for staff to pursue The North Carolina Division of Pollution Prevention and Environmental Assistance 2009 Community Waste Reduction and Recycling Grant and authorize the County Manager to execute the grant application and grant agreement if Union County is selected as a recipient.

BACKGROUND: NC Statute 130A-309.10 prohibits televisions from being disposed of by landfilling by 2010 and computer equipment by 2012. Union County is not currently recycling electronic equipment. UCPW, the General Services Department and the City of Monroe have been jointly exploring electronic recycling opportunities. Considerable research has been conducted on the topic and as a result a Request for Proposal (RFP) for electronics disposal services is being developed and will be placed on the street in early 2009. Infrastructure and educational efforts will need to be in place in order to have an effective program. The North Carolina Division of Pollution Prevention and Environmental Assistance is offering a 2009 Community Waste Reduction and Recycling Grant. The grant monies may be used for equipment purchases and public awareness/education. Applicants are eligible for a maximum award of \$25,000.00. Grant winners must provide a cash match equivalent to 20 percent of the requested grant funding.

Infrastructure needs – In order to be marketable, electronic equipment must be stored out of the weather. Approximately nine (9) modest storage buildings are need for collection and storage of the electronics. These buildings will be placed at each of the six (6) Solid Waste Convenience Sites located throughout the county, the Transfer Station and two (2) yet-to-be determined locations within the limits of the City. The cost of each building is estimated to be \$1,500.00. No additional infrastructure/equipment costs are anticpated.

Educational needs – In order to promote public awareness of the program, local radio spots, flyers, pamphlets and billing inserts will be needed. The estimated cost for the development,

printing and distribution of educational material is \$11,500 dollars. Additional educational avenues that have little to no cost such as advertising on channel 16 and the County web site will also be utilized.

FINANCIAL IMPACT: Total grant dollars to be requested will be \$25,000 = (9 buildings x \$1500) + (\$11,500 advertising). Adequate match funds are available in the current Solid Waste operating budget.

BACKGROUND: On September 9, 2008 the Union Smart Start Board approved funding for a Smart Start Eligibility Support Program, Income Maintenance Caseworker II position (via contracted services), which will be provided by the Union County Department of Social Services. The Smart Start Eligibility Support program will provide for a contract for an Income Maintenance Caseworker who will be located in the Union County Health Department (UCHD) and supervised by the Department of Social Services (DSS). The caseworker, preferably bilingual, will take applications and determine eligibility for the Family and Children's Medicaid Program (specifically, children birth to five who are not yet in kindergarten and pregnant women). The Caseworker will also complete mail-in applications and assist other DSS staff as time permits. Smart Start funds will cover approximately 50% of the Income Maintenance Caseworker's position and will be a match to draw down additional funds. Many clients come to UCHD without medical coverage for their children and must be referred to DSS to complete the application process. By having an onsite case worker, clients will receive better customer service, be enrolled sooner and thereby receive services in a timelier manner. This project will collaborate with and complete the cycle of the current Health Check Coordinators by qualifying children for medical coverage and accessing a medical home.

Barry Groome Appeal

The basis of this appeal requests 30 lots of the proposed subdivision Edenshire be ranked a higher priority than in the current version. Currently Edenshire has 26 lots in Priority 'D' of the <u>Water Allocation Policy</u> and 4 lots in Priority 'B' of the <u>Water Allocation Policy</u>. Priority 'D' was created for projects that do not qualify for sewer but were submitted for consideration during the public notice for projects that wished to be included in the <u>Water Allocation Policy</u>. Priority 'B' consists of projects that qualify for sewer under UCPW criteria but had not secured a sewer permit from the State at the time of adoption but can proceed immediately. The water permitting in Priority 'B' mirrors the sewer permitting. Mr. Groome secured four (4) sewer taps, one for each of the parcels that will consist of the future Edenshire, which qualified the same in Priority 'B' of the <u>Water Allocation Policy</u>.

Documentation provided with the appeal includes a Water and Sewer Availability Letter dated February 4, 2008, to Mr. Groome, that offers 5 water taps per existing parcel. Four distinct parcels were identified in this letter and these are the parcels that comprise the proposed Edenshire development. Please note that in the same letter each one of these parcels was offered one (1) sewer tap. Noting that these 20 water taps were made available in advance of the August 20, 2008 Commissioner Motion, the availability is legitimate. Summarizing the above information based on the information provided, Edneshire qualified to move 16 lots from Priority 'D' to Priority 'B'. This totals 20 lots in Priority 'B' of the policy while ten (10) taps remain in the Priority D category as no water availability has been secured for them at this point.

Crismark Appeal

The appeal for Crismark contends we omitted 150 multi-family units and 24.5 acres of future commercial development from the <u>Water Allocation Policy</u>. The developer believes these future phases were included in the original water availability letter issued for the entire development. Upon investigation, paperwork found in the Crismark files validates the claim to include the future phases. The allocated water capacity for these phases was based on data from a water model that studied the future demand the entire development would generate on UCPW water system. This study was performed

on July 30, 2001. Based on the above information the undeveloped phases of Crismark will be placed in Priority 'B' of the <u>Water Allocation Policy</u>.

Hudson Manor Appeal

The developer of Hudson Manor did not file a formal appeal from the Policy; however they did contact staff regarding the status of their project. Had an appeal been filed it is undecided whether it would have been approved. Based upon conversations with the developer, staff felt that a written response should be sent even though an appeal was not filed. No water has been allocated to this project at this time.

Providence Downs South III Appeal

Appeal alleged the above mentioned project was not included in the Water Allocation Policy while qualifying for water allocation. Providence Downs South III exists in the current policy and was overlooked by the engineer who authored the appeal.

Reunion Land Company Appeal

Above claim describes 72 water and sewer taps that owner believes qualify for policy inclusion. The origin and validity of the taps are under legal investigation and pending decision does not qualify for allocation in the <u>Water Allocation Policy</u>. Once legal review is complete we may need to review this appeal again.

Sheridan and Longford Village Appeals

Both appeals were combined into one as they have a common owner. The Sheridan claim indicates there should be 245 lots identified for the Sheridan subdivision in Priority 'A' of the Water Allocation Policy. The existing policy contains Sheridan Phase I and Sheridan Phase II under the priority 'A' category. The sum of the lots contained in both phases totals 245 lots. These lots are already accounted for in the policy.

The owner further claims Longford Village qualifies for Priority 'A' status rather than the current Priority 'C' status in the policy. Longford Village does not have a water permit which is required for Priority 'A' inclusion. The decision keeps Longford Village in Priority 'C' with 8% (or 5 lots) of the lot total included in the higher priority. This is consistent with other Priority 'C' projects.

Sun Valley Commons Phase I Appeal

Appeal contends above mentioned commercial site has been omitted from the policy. Investigation reveals that project has both water and sewer permits there for qualifying it for allocation in the <u>Water Allocation Policy</u>.

DEPARTMENT'S RECOMMENDED ACTION: Report the Sewer Allocation of 2875 gpd to the Preventech Project and include in the Sewer Allocation Policy adopted by the County Commissioners on September 17, 2007. Project is located on 4330 Matthews-Indian Trail Road.

BACKGROUND: As described in section 2.6 of the Sewer Allocation Policy, a project may be allocated sewer in the Sewer Allocation Policy when the strict enforcment of the policy 'would frustrate the pupose of the guidelines and/or endanger the health, safety or welfare of the citizens of Union County.' As described in the attached letter this project has suffered extraordinary circumstances that has resulted in them receiving sewer allocation. The project originally was to receive sewer service through septic as no availability existed in the UCPW system. A building was erected on the site as a result of the septic approval by Union County Environmental Department. When grading the site to prepare for septic installation the topsoil was inadvertantly removed which is a critical layer for the functionality of a septic system. Union County Environmental Health reviewed the site and concluded that the site is no longer conducive to a septic system and no improvements to the site would improve the situation. The project, which had attained a pump and haul permit from NCDENR due to original conditions. had no alternative but to plea with UCPW for a sewer tap to our system. After two months discussion with the legal team and gathering information pertaining to the project, UCPW agrees there is no other recourse but to allocate sewer to the project or present a health hazard condition to the County.

Dear Mr. King:

We have recently communicated regarding your request for sewer treatment service from Union County for the newly constructed commercial facility owned by Alton Properties, LLC at 4330 Matthews-Indian Trail Road, ("Alton Properties"). I understand that your facility would require 2875 gallons per day of treatment service.

Your property is located in the area served by the Twelve Mile Creek Treatment Plant. Currently, Union County is not providing sewer service to new customers in this area because of limited sewer treatment capacity. As a general rule, Union County is providing sewer service only to those new customers that are specifically listed to receive service under Union County's Policy for Allocating Wastewater Treatment Capacity (the "Policy") The purpose of this letter is to set forth Union County's decision that although your facility is not listed as receiving sewer service under the Policy, your facility will be allowed 2875 gallons per day of sewer treatment under the Policy due to a health, safety and welfare issue. It is important to document for the record the reason for this decision.

By way of review, the Policy was adopted in order to allocate the limited amount of sewer treatment capacity among various competing projects. There are numerous ways that a project can qualify as being eligible for receiving sewer service under the Policy. Your project does not meet any of the eligibility tests to justify placing it on the list of projects that are to receive sewer treatment service under the Policy.

When you began construction of your facility, you recognized that you would not receive sewer service from Union County. You planned to dispose of wastewater by means of an on-site Wastewater Disposal System (a "septic system"). You obtained a septic system permit from Union County Environmental Health, and, based upon the septic system permit, you obtained a building permit and began construction.

Unfortunately, during the construction process, your grading contractor severely graded the area for the septic system. Union County Environmental Health has therefore revoked the septic system permit, and advises that the area cannot be repaired, and there is not another suitable site for a septic system on your property. In addition, you have consulted with a

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licensed soil scientist, who has determined that there are no other options available for on-site sewer disposal due to poor soil conditions on the property.

On October 6, 2008, the North Carolina Department of Environment and Natural Resources, Division of Water Quality, issued a "pump and haul permit" to you. Under the pump and haul permit, you are entitled to temporarily pump and haul wastewater from your facility.

Pump and haul permits are not favored. Sewage spills can occur during the collection and transportation process, which is a health and safety issue. It is much more likely for a sewage spill to occur when disposing of sewage by use of a pump and haul permit than by allowing you to tap into the gravity sewer line that exists in the area of your property.

Section 2.6 of the Policy provides as follows: "Subject to approval of the County Manager, the Union County Public Works Director may authorize a departure from these guidelines when strict adherence would frustrate the purpose of these guidelines or endanger the health, safety or welfare of the citizens of Union County." I have decided that, under the unique circumstances of this matter, it would frustrate the purpose of the Policy to deny sewer treatment service to your project. It is in the interests of the public to grant sewer treatment service to your project, so you can eliminate the collection and transportation of wastewater under the pump and haul permit.

I have therefore decided that your project shall receive 2875 gallons per day of treatment capacity in the Twelve Mile Creek Service area under Section 2.6 of the Policy. You must submit your application for service within 90 days from the date of this letter upon forms approved by Union County Public Works, and pay all applicable fees and costs, including capacity fees and tap charges.
