Proclamation In Support of Establishing "Drug Court Month"

WHEREAS, 2009 marks the Twentieth Anniversary of the Miami-Dade Drug Court, the first Drug Court in the nation. That court sparked a national revolution that changed the face of the American Justice System; and

WHEREAS, for the past twenty years Drug Courts have been restoring lives, reuniting families and making communities across the nation safer; and

WHEREAS, Drug Courts provide focus and leadership for community-wide partnerships, bringing together public safety and public health professionals in the fight against substance abuse and criminality; and

WHEREAS, approximately 80 percent of respondent parents involved in Family Drug Treatment Courts are successfully reunited with their children; and

WHEREAS, results of more than 100 program evaluations and at least four meta-analytic studies have yielded definitive evidence that Drug Courts are demonstratively effective and significantly improve substance-abuse treatment outcomes, substantially reduce drug abuse and crime, and do so at less expense than any other justice strategy; and

WHEREAS, The Drug Court movement has grown from the 12 original Drug Courts in 1994 to 2,031 operational Drug Courts and 3,410 problem solving courts as of December 2008; and

WHEREAS, the U-FIRST (Union – Families In Recovery Staying Together) Program of Union County was established in July of 2006 and continues to work with parents struggling with the disease of addiction, in hopes for parents to achieve and maintain sobriety, in order to gain skills to properly parent their children.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Union County, declares that a "Drug Court Month" be established during the Month of May, 2009, recognizing the practitioners and participants who make drug courts work and the significant contributions that Drug Courts have made, and continue to make, in reducing drug usage and crime.

DEPARTMENT'S RECOMMENDED ACTION: Award contruction bid to the lowest responsible bidder, authorize the County Manager to approve the agreement and adopt Capital Project Ordinance Amendment # 116

BACKGROUND: At the meeting of April 6th, staff was directed to negotiate with the low bidder for these two projects (Dawn Development Company) in an effort to reduce the contract amount for the Polk Mountain portion of the project so that the costs might be brought within the original project estimates in terms of the residents financial involvement.

Bids for Wellington Woods were within the original participant's budget. Wellington Woods I Subdivision is located off Potter Road near the intersection of Forest Lawn Drive. The project consist of approximately 4,600 lf of waterline and appurtenances serving approximately 28 residential customers.

The Polk Mountain Subdivision is located off of New Salem Road in Northeastern Union County. The project consists of approximately 8,000 If of waterline and appurtenances serving approximately 41 residential customers. Both of these projects were bid as one contract in order to attract the most competative bid possible. The projects were bid on March 6, 2009 with ten bids received. Bid prices ranged from \$284,667.97 to \$419,072.50. Bids were checked and certified by HDR Engineering, Inc. of the Carolinas with a recommendation of award to the low bidder, Dawn Development, Co. in the amount of \$284,667.97.

As was reported on April 6th, the bids for Polk Mountain needed to be negotiated down by approximately \$20,000 in order to keep costs to participants within the original estimate. Since April 6th, Interim Public Works Director, Scott Huneycutt has negotiated with the low bidder to

achieve the necessary savings. The original bid specifications called for water services to be installed by the contractor to serve all parcels in the project area, whether the owner had agreed to participate in the project or not. Much of the proposed savings was achieved by eliminating the service lines to non-participating properties. Actual total savings negotiated from the Polk Mountain Bid was \$20,262.68.

AMENDMENT TO UNION COUNTY VOLUNTARY AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT & ENHANCED VOLUNTARY AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners adopted the Union County Voluntary Agricultural District & Enhanced Voluntary Agricultural District Ordinance (the "Ordinance") on November 17, 2008, with an effective date of February 1, 2009; and

WHEREAS, on January 20, 2009, the Board extended the effective date to March 1, 2009; and

WHEREAS, on February 16, 2009, the Board extended the effective date to May 1, 2009; and

WHEREAS, certain provisions of the Ordinance continue to require additional analysis prior to implementation; and

WHEREAS, the Board thus desires to extend the effective date a third time.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Union County Board of Commissioners as follows:

1. In Article XVII(D), as amended, delete "May 1, 2009" and replace with "July 15, 2009" such that this subsection reads as rewritten:

"The Effective Date of this Ordinance shall be July 15, 2009."

2. Except as herein amended, the provisions of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

DEPARTMENT'S RECOMMENDED ACTION: Adopt Resolution Authorizing Upset Bid Process

BACKGROUND: The County has received an offer (\$10,000.00) to purchase a well lot (Parcel # 05113019) located in Waxhaw, N.C. The well lot, an asset of the enterprise system, is no longer used by Public Works and is not essential to the water system. The lot contains 0.82 acres and has a land tax value of \$47,480.00. Under North Carolina Statutes, the County is required to advertise the offer to purchase and provide other interested parties an opportunity to purchase the property.

Comments from Legal Department: Pursuant to North Carolina law, real property may be disposed of by auction, sealed bid, upset bid, or exchange. The upset bid process, proposed for this tract, gives other potential purchasers the opportunity to bid, thus arguably maximizing the price to be received by the County. The procedure begins with receipt of an offer on a specific tract. The matter is taken to the Board of Commissioners, which "proposes to accept" the offer (as stated in the statute, though with the understanding that the Board may reject bids or withdraw the property from sale at any time), and the Clerk then publishes notice of the offer. Other bidders have 10 days during which to make an upset bid, which must exceed the preceding bid by an amount equal to 10% of the first one thousand dollars and 5% of the remainder. The process continues until no qualifying upset bid is received. The highest bid is taken to the Board, which may accept or reject the offer.

The present case is unusual in that the County is being requested by the initial offeror to authorize rezoning/conditional use of the property by the Town of Waxhaw prior to purchase. Although this request may seem premature (if, for example, the initial offeror does not purchase the property), the offeror's attorney has indicated that the County-owned tract will be removed

from the collection of tracts for which rezoning is sought if the County property has not been purchased by May 11, which date immediately precedes a public hearing on the rezoning by the Waxhaw Board of Commissioners. We have contacted the Town planner who indicates that the County would be able to seek rezoning of this property without delay in the event the property were removed prior to consideration at the hearing, i.e. the County would not be penalized in this manner for removal of the rezoning request at this stage of their process. The offeror's attorney has been informed that it may be difficult to complete the upset bid process prior to the May 12 hearing date, given the potential for upset bids and the necessity for Board approval with only two regular meetings prior to May 12. He has elected to proceed with this request and will make an appearance at the Board meeting.



RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING UPSET BID PROCESS

WHEREAS, Union County is the owner of a vacant parcel of real property, approximately .82 acres in size near N. Broad Street in Waxhaw, North Carolina, and having a Union County Tax Parcel Number of 05113019 (the "Subject Property"), as shown on the map attached as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 160A-269, Union County is authorized to dispose of real property by upset bid after receipt of an offer for the property; and

WHEREAS, Union County has received an offer to purchase the Subject Property in the amount of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00), submitted by Historic Ventures LLC ("Historic Ventures"); and

WHEREAS, Historic Ventures has paid the required five percent (5%) deposit on its offer.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Union County Board of Commissioners (the "Board") as follows:

- The Board proposes to accept Historic Ventures' offer and authorizes sale of the Subject Property through the upset bid procedure of N.C.G.S. § 160A-269; provided that final acceptance of the final high offer shall be subject to approval by the Board. The Board reserves the right to withdraw the Subject Property from sale at any time before the final high bid is accepted and further reserves the right to reject at any time all bids.
- 2. The Clerk to the Board shall cause a notice of the proposed sale to be published. Such notice shall include a general description of the Subject Property, the amount and terms of the offer, and a statement that within ten (10) days any person may raise the bid in accordance with the procedure outlined in this Resolution.
- 3. Persons desiring to upset the offer that has been received shall submit a sealed bid with their offer to the office of the Clerk to the Board within ten (10) days after the notice of sale is published. Bids shall be submitted no later than 5:00 p.m. on the last day of the 10-day period, and the Clerk shall date-stamp bids upon receipt. The mailing and physical address of the Clerk to the Board is as follows:

Ms. Lynn West, Clerk to the Board 500 N. Main Street, Room 925 Monroe, NC 28112 The envelope containing the bid shall be clearly marked "Sealed Bid for Property Located near N. Broad St. in Waxhaw." It shall be the specific responsibility of the bidder to deliver his bid to the Clerk to the Board at the appointed place and prior to the announced time for the opening of bids. Late delivery of a bid for any reason, including delivery by United States Mail or other carrier, will disqualify the bid.

- 4. A qualifying higher bid is one that raises the existing offer by not less than ten percent (10%) of the first one thousand dollars (\$1,000) and five percent (5%) of the remainder. A qualifying higher bid must also be accompanied by a deposit in the amount of five percent (5%) of the bid. The deposit may be made in cash, cashier's check, or certified check. The County will return the deposit on any bid not accepted, and will return the deposit on an offer subject to upset if a qualifying higher bid is received. If the Board agrees to sell the Subject Property, the County will return the deposit of the final high bidder at closing. If, after acceptance by the Board of the final high bid, the final high bidder fails to close the sale in accordance with the terms of this Resolution and any purchase agreement, then in such event the bid deposit of the high bidder shall be forfeited.
- 5. At the conclusion of the 10-day period, the Clerk to the Board shall open the bids, if any, and the highest such qualifying bid will become the new offer. If there is more than one bid in the highest amount, the first such bid received will become the new offer. If a qualifying higher bid is received, the Clerk to the Board shall cause a new notice of upset bid to be published, and shall continue to do so until a 10-day period has passed without any qualifying upset bid having been received. At that time, the amount of the final high bid shall be reported to the Board of Commissioners. The Board shall determine whether or not to accept the final high bid not later than ninety (90) days after the final upset bid period has passed.
- Bidders shall not attach any conditions to their bids. Any conditions attached to bids
 received for purchase of the Subject Property shall render the bid non-responsive, and
 such bid shall not be considered by the Board.
- 7. The buyer must pay with cash at the time of closing.

Request of Historic Ventures, LLC in the Town of Waxhaw

INTRODUCTION

Representatives of our client, Historic Ventures, LLC ("Ventures"), and I will appear at your Monday, April 6, 2009 meeting to request that Union County consent to a rezoning and conditional use permit request for real property Union County owns in the Town of Waxhaw, North Carolina on North Broad Street (the "Union County Parcel"). The Union County Parcel contains approximately .82 acres and it is designated as Parcel No. 05113019 on the Union County Tax Maps. The Union County Parcel is more particularly depicted on the attached Parcel Location Map 1 and Parcel Location Map 2. We are submitting this memorandum to provide you with information on Ventures' request prior to your April 6, 2009 meeting.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION ON VENTURES' PROPOSED MIXED USE DEVELOPMENT

Ventures is assembling approximately 16.6 acres of real property located on Church Street, NC Highway 16, Price Street and Broad Street in the Town of Waxhaw (the "Mixed Use Site") for the purpose of developing a quality mixed use project on the Mixed Use Site that could consist of office, retail, governmental, educational and multi-family uses. The governmental uses could include a new Town Hall for Waxhaw (if it is approved by the Town of Waxhaw Board of Commissioners) and a public library. I am attaching a copy of the current site plan of Ventures' proposed mixed use project for your review. As you can see from the site plan, it would be a pedestrian friendly and well designed development that would include a large town square or town green in the center of the project. I am also attaching building elevations that depict the design, quality and character of the buildings that would be located in this mixed use project.

The Union County Parcel is included within the Mixed Use Site and it is located in the northwestern corner of the Mixed Use Site. As you can see from the attached site plan, a water quality pond and buffer are proposed to be located on the Union County Parcel under Ventures' development proposal. As I understand it, the Union County Parcel is currently zoned R-4.

REZONING AND CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT REQUEST IN THE TOWN OF WAXHAW

To accommodate this proposed mixed use project, the Mixed Use Site (including the Union County Parcel) must be rezoned to the CU-C4 zoning district by the Town of Waxhaw, and a conditional use permit must be issued. Ventures has filed with the Town of Waxhaw an application to rezone the Mixed Use Site to the CU-C4 zoning district and to obtain a conditional use permit to allow the development of the proposed mixed use project on the Mixed Use Site.

REQUEST FOR UNION COUNTY'S CONSENT

Because Union County owns one of the parcels that comprises the Mixed Use Site, to move forward with the rezoning and conditional use permit process as currently proposed, it is necessary that Ventures either acquires the Union County Parcel prior to moving forward, or that Union County consent to the rezoning/conditional use permit request. Ventures is in the process of trying to acquire the Union County Parcel and it has been working with Barry Wyatt of Union County do so.

Ventures desires to continue to move forward with the rezoning and conditional use permit process and to have these matters considered by the Waxhaw Planning Board at its April 20, 2009 meeting and by the Waxhaw Town Board of Commissioners at its May 12, 2009 meeting. To do so, it is necessary that revised plans and all required consents and signatures be submitted to the Town of Waxhaw no later than Tuesday, April 7, 2009. Unfortunately, Ventures will not be able to acquire the Union County Parcel prior to April 10, 2009.

Ventures has been working on this proposed project for approximately one and one-half years and Ventures believes that there is positive momentum surrounding the project and strong interest from potential tenants and occupants thereof. For these reasons, Ventures desires to proceed under the schedule set out above so that this project does not experience any delays.

As noted above, to be able to move forward under Ventures' desired schedule, Ventures needs to obtain Union County's written consent to the rezoning/conditional use permit request. Therefore, Ventures respectfully requests this written consent under the terms specified below.

As a condition to Union County's consent to the rezoning/conditional use permit request, Ventures would execute a letter agreement in which it would commit that if Ventures is unable to acquire the Union County Parcel prior to May 11, 2009 (the day before the public hearing before the Waxhaw Town Board of Commissioners), Ventures will amend its rezoning and conditional use permit request to remove the Union County Parcel therefrom. All of this would be done, of course, at no expense to Union County.


PARCEL LOCATION MAP 1








WAXHAW TOWN CENTER VICINITY MAP






MIXED USE DEVELOPMENT WAXHAW, NORTH CAROLINA AERIAL OVERLAY

Resolution Against Any Changes to Local Government - SECOND RESOLUTION

4/20/09

Whereas, in 2007, Representative Pryor Gibson put a referendum on the ballot for Union County voters to approve, or disapprove districts for Union County. Wherein the districts before the voters were wildly disparate in population, ranging from two under 13,500 to those of almost 25,000 to over 27,500. And, wherein, said referendum was defeated with a vote of almost 60% opposed.

Whereas, in 2008, in response to a new proposal, 10 municipalities in Union County passed resolutions in opposition to having the State of North Carolina dictate our form of government to us.

Whereas, on December 15, 2008, The Union County Board of Commissioners passed a Resolution "requesting that the North Carolina General Assembly make no changes to the composition of the Union County Board of Commissioners".

Whereas, in 2009, a committee has been established, by the Union County Board of Commissioners, to address the issue of composition of the board. This committee has a seat at the table for all 14 municipalities and each Commissioner has the opportunity to appoint two people from the unincorporated area of Union County.

Whereas, on April 1, 2009 Representative Prior Gibson filed HB 981 in another attempt to force legislation to alter our local body of government.

Whereas, Representative Gibson was quoted as saying "Nobody in their right mind could oppose having a vote on the matter of governance." (Charlotte Observer, 6/28/07)

Whereas, HB981, contrary to G.S.153A-58(3)a. and G.S.153A-60, would eliminate a referendum of the people, thereby silencing the collective voice of the voters of Union County, North Carolina, for two election cycles.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Union County Board of Commissioners requests that the North Carolina General Assembly resist any attempt to alter the Board of Union County Commissioners. Furthermore, we unequivocally believe in the North Carolina Constitution, the Constitution of the United States of America, and the freedom within our democracy and therefore believe that any changes to the composition, terms and governance style of the Board of County Commissioners be decided by the voters of Union County.

Be it further resolved that the people of the County of Union have the opportunity to vote for the composition of their government, as is their privilege, if so called for by the people and that this referendum be held in the general election of 2010, to avoid undue expense during this trying time.

Be it further resolved that, if the referendum is approved by the voters of Union County, the Census of 2010 be used in the drawing of equitable districts, according to law, in 2012, and presented during the Presidential election, virtually assuring the largest voice of the people.

Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the members of the Union County legislative delegation and the members of the North Carolina General Assembly.

DEPARTMENT'S RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve

BACKGROUND: In February 2008, the Union County Board of Commissioners Directed Staff to develop a recommended Water Conservation Program as part of a comprehensive strategy to address the increasing need for water supply, reduce water system demand (i.e., per capita use), and defer long-term capital expenditures for the water and wastewater system. The program is designed to be implemented over a five year "phase-in" period, beginning in fiscal year 2009-10. The enclosed document represents a comprehensive strategy including sections regarding the development of new water supplies; expansion of Union County's (County) reclaimed water program, and other water management related initiatives. The proposed plan was developed by a working group consisting of Kevin Mosteller of HDR Engineering, Scott Huneycutt, Matthew Delk, UCPW Business Manager Eric Hardy, and others.

The program includes both supply-side and demand side water use management strategies. The supply-side strategies include management strategies to be implemented by Union County Public Works. These strategies include a GIS based Leak Detection and Repair program and the development of a Distribution System Flushing Optimization program. Demand side water conservation strategies include many initiatives, including the development of a comprehensive Water Reuse program, the development of a Public Education program, a Water Audit program, a 3-day Alternate Irrigation Schedule, and a Fixture Rebate program.


The successful implementation of this program will eventually require two new staff positions, in addition to adding new administrative and public relations duties to existing personnel. Due to planning needs and financial conditions, the plan recommends adding the two positions in year

two of the program. The titles and duties of the positions are detailed in the plan. The additional positions will also monitor and update management regarding performance statistics and cost effectiveness metrics. The plan stipulates that a comprehensive report will be presented to the Board annually.

FINANCIAL IMPACT: The proposed water conservation annual budget ranges from \$30,000 in year 1 to \$275,000 in year 5.

2.0 Purpose

This Water Conservation Program (Program) is designed to promote efficient, wise, and more conservative water use among the County's Water System customers. Union County's attractive quality of life, coupled with its proximity to urban centers for employment and other activities, has led to significant growth in the County's population and, consequently, increased water use.

The County Water System is currently supplied by two major raw water sources – the Catawba River and the Yadkin-Pee Dee River – that emanate from adjacent counties. Geographically, Union County is divided by a ridge line that separates the County into these two major drainage basins. Rapid growth, coupled with regional issues associated with inter-basin transfers of water, has presented complex water resource challenges for the County

This Program represents one element of a comprehensive approach to effectively manage the County's evallable water resources. The Program is designed to promote water conservation among the County's users on an origing, year round basis. The County's Water Conservation undinance (a separate objective water careaby in place) appresses operation on the County's water system is any water usin restrictions out in a prought of cities.



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In summary, Union County's Water Conservation Program has been designed for long-term management of water use to eliminate waste and maximize efficiency among its customers. This Program promotes a more sustainable approach to the region's continued growth, given a limited water supply.

3.0 Program Overview

The Water Conservation Program is initially designed with a 5-year implementation plan beginning in fiscal year (FY) 09-10. During this 5-year 'phase-in' period, the Program will be enhanced through the addition of staff and increased financial resources. Specific Program elements are proposed to be added for each year of the 5-year implementation period. Goals and metrics for the Program and water conservation measures are established and may be refined on an on-going basis.

The Water Conservation Program includes both supply-side and demand-side water use management strategies. Supply-side elements focus on management strategies to be implemented by Union County Public Works (UCPW) in the operation of the water system and in getting water to customers. Demand-side elements focus on measures (e.g., plumbing fixture replacement) and incentives (inclining block water rate structure) for the County's customer base to increase water use efficiency and preserve this natural resource.

Several components of this Water Conservation Program require additional study, investigation, and/or evaluation to determine the County's return on investment. It is anticipated that this Program will be updated annually and that performance metrics will be utilized to measure progress. In addition, the County's annual budgeting process and overall financial condition will drive annual revisions to the Program.

4.0 Brand

Successful water conservation programs have a significant public education component. For many water conservation initiatives, water systems must rely on their customers to conserve water. As a result, water conservation programs typically develop a brand that is easily communicated to the public and that maintains a continuous association with water use efficiency. Other brands include examples such as: WATERSMART, and Tap + Smart.

Union County's Water Conservation Program brand will be developed during Year 1 of the Program. UCPW staff may solicit input from the Board of County Commissioners, other County staff, or hold a contest for the public (e.g., through the school system) to develop a brand for the Program. As a 'placeholder', the following brand is designated until consensus is achieved on an alternative:

Union - Use - Optimized)

This brand simply states the linkage of water conservation between Union County and its customers with a target of optimized use.

Union County will also become a partner with EPA's WaterSense Program. The WaterSense Program is EPA's national brand for water use efficiency. The brand serves as both a product label and a symbol of the importance of water efficiency in the United States. The WaterSense partnership includes manufacturers, retailers and distributors, promotional partners (e.g., Union County), landscape professionals, and certifying organizations. WaterSense encourages water-efficient equipment, behaviors, and the purchase of quality products that use less water.

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rinst, the Assumed Leakage fother Bernled Unabtourned For Water) ranges from 8.6% (15.6%, with an average of 12.4% in its likewithat a portion of this Assumed Leakage is combrised of unanletered water use for busk hadiers, distribution main flushing, new development pipeline flushing, and other local fire department uses. While Assumed Leakage of 10-15% is not unusual for many older, more urbanized water systems, it should be noted that Union County's water system is still relatively young (less than 20 years) and much of the distribution system is located outside urbanized areas. Therefore, the 10-15% Assumed Leakage value represents an opportunity for supply-side water conservation strategies to reduce this value. UCPW staff is already developing plans to document and reduce, or meter, current unmetered uses as outlined above.

Second, residential account usage has varied from 201 - 241 gpd per account, with an average value of approximately 215 gpd per account over the four-year period (approximately 240 gpd/account over the last two years). This average residential usage equates to over 6,500 gallons per month per residential account. This residential usage is higher than other regional users and national norms. Further, over the past few years, it appears that the trend, or gradient, of residential water use is on the increase – even during periods where water use restrictions were in place. Moreover, usage seems to be increasing even though the increasing block water rate structure which was revised in April 2005 charged higher water rates at lower thresholds of monthly water use. (Note: this increasing block structure was further revised in August 2008). Thus, it appears that



there is opportunity for water conservation among the County's residential customers.

in addition to these findings, it should be noted that the County's current peak day demand to average day demand ratio is approximately 2.0. This value is significantly higher than similar regional water systems where typical peak day to average day ratios are in the 1.4 - 1.6 range. Current long-term water system master planning in Unior, County is being based on a peaking factor of 3.6 to help reduce the capital costs of water supply and treatment infrastructure. Thus, water conservation initiatives such as those outlined herein are necessary to achieve long-term water supply management goals in Union County or addition, the County Will also need to focus or fand use planning to help reduce irrigation permands or promote recizimed water use. The unified Development Croinance that is currently being developed car, be utilized to promote water conservation strategies.

By maximizing efficient water use, the County's customers will realize lower costs at 0, over the longterm, the County will realize eignificant savings on deferred capital and operating crists associated with treatment and distribution system intrastructure.

The return of investment to water conservation initiatives is measurable, incriexample, reducing the County's residential costomer (approximately 85,000 accounts) average use from 240 gpd/acct to 199 gpd/acct, reduces current water demand by approximately 1.44 mgd. At an estimated cost of 55 per gallon for additional treated water capacity, the overall savings is approximately \$7.2 M in addition, the County benefits by lowering demand on existing distribution system infrastructure in thus, deferring future capital and operations costs as well.

7.0 Demand-Side Program Elements

Demand side conservation focuses or water customer demand. Various measures and/or incentives carbe put in place to encourage or require more efficient water use behavior from the County's customers. Presented in Table 1 below is a summary of the demand-side water conservation measures and strategies for the County's U₂O Program.

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As part of the Water Conservation Program, a periodic review of the water rate structure and its impact on usage, revenues and water demand is required. One element of the rate structure that is currently under review is the approach to water rates for select customers who are irrigating areas for beneficial community use (e.g., recreation).

7.2 Water Reuse Program.

Water reuse is the process of using treated wastewater to take the place of certain water system demands that do not require a drinking water quality level of treatment. Landscape irrigation, cooling water, street sweeping, and dust control ate all examples of where water reuse can be employed to ease demands on existing drinking water supplies. Union County has conducted limited evaluation and investment into water reuse opportunities. In fact, currently both the 12 Mile Creek WWTP and the Crooked Creek WWTP treat a portion of the wastewater to a reuse quality where it is made available for bulk haulers.

implementation of water reuse programs has gained traction in North Carolina over the past few years as many water systems have struggled through droughts and increasing customer demands. For systems such as Union County that have geographical challenges (i.e. interbasin transfer issues) related to water supply, water reuse offers excellent opportunities to offset peak water demands and significantly reduce per capita (or per account) use. For water customers water reuse offers the potential for lower costs, and the opportunity to irrigate during drought conditions (since these systems are exempt from requirements of regional drought water use restrictions).

The development of a water reuse program requires capital investment, cost recovery, and a strong public relations effort. It may also include the development of local cromances that promote or require water reuse systems to be installed by developers.

The development of an effective water reuse plants alkey strategy in achieving the goals outlined for this Program. The plantshall include an analysis of potential lusers, compliance with applicable regulatory framework, associated capital-operations costs, repulsed chances and public melations efforts, and an implementation schedule.

The Water Conservation Program coordinator shall maintain frexibility in these public relations programs to maximize target audiences and maintain creativity in delivering the message.

7.4 Web Page Development

A U_2C Program web page is developed and maintained as a communications tool for County customers. The web page includes a list of key contacts, public education information, Program features, water efficiency weblinks, and Program policies and forms.

7.5 Xeriscaping Demonstration Gardens

Xeriscaping refers to landscaping and gardening in a way that minimizes the use of supplemental irrigation. Plant species native to the area's climate are emphasized along with careful planning so as to maximize the capture of rainfall and minimize run-off.

The County seeks partners (e.g., Master Gardners, NC Green industry Council) to develop Demphstration Xeriscape Gardens at one or more public locations (e.g., Cane Creek Park, Jesse Helms Park), and utilize these sites for public education events and workshops.

7.6 Bill Inserts

Level 3 includes a site visit made by a Frogram staff member to a location for completion of the audit. These audits may be used for larger firigation systems, senior citizens, or at facilities such as libraries, government buildings, and parks.

Based on the findings of the water audit, a free water conservation kit may be provided that includes a low flow snower head, faucet aerators, leak detection tablets, plumbers tape, and/or other fixture replacements. As the water audit program is developed, consideration may be given to assessing a fee for services.



7.9 3-Day Alternate arrigation Schedule

Unior. County has historically not restricted water use to customers. However, over the past few years as the region has suffered from two severe droughts and rapid development of the County with large lot subdivisions has driven up peak day demands, the County has had to place restrictions on outdoor water use. During periods of drought, the County's irrigation schedule is driven by the Water Conservation Ordinance and the County's participation in the regional Catawba-Wateree Drought Management Advisory Group (CW-DMAG). Response during future droughts will continue to be driven by the requirements of the Water Conservation Ordinance and CW-DMAG.

Alkel, goal of this Water Conservation Program is to reduce peak bary demands during normal climatic conditions, thereby extending the dapadity of available water supplies and existing infrastructure, and deferring future dapadit costs. As such, the Water Conservation Program includes an irrigation schedule that allows dustomers to irrigate awn and is oscale only according to the following schedule (i.e., 8 days der week). 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Exceptions to this irrigation schedule are outlined as follows:

- Hand watering of lawn and landscape is permitted on any day.
- Watering up to 21 days to establish new turf from sod or seed.
- Watering new plant material such as flowers, trees, and shrubs on the day of planting.
- Watering essential to preserve turf subject to heavy public use.
- Operating an irrigation system for installation, repair, or reasonable maintenance, so long as the system is attended throughout the period of operation.

7.10 'Weather-Based' Irrigation Controllers (WBIC) - Pilot Program

Union County has been investigating the use of weather-based irrigation controllers as a means to optimize the outdoor irrigation demand from its customers. A weather-based irrigation controller provides a level of intelligence to a customer's irrigation system by allowing the system to consider factors such as:

Irrigation zone size

Location variables: plant or lawn type, soil type, slope

Weather variables: recent precipitation, temperature, solar radiation, humidity,

wind.

Weather satellites provide daily updates to the irrigation controllers to allow accurate determination of irrigation demand.

Widespread implementation of these systems may offer the opportunity for significant benefits to both the County and its customers. Consideration, however, must be given to the costs and operations and maintenance issues associated with widespread implementation. Union County has been in discussions with the NC Green Industry Council on a pilot program for these weather-based irrigation controllers.

Given current financial constraints, committing to a pilot program is not included in the U_2O Program. However, County staff will continue to monitor this new technology and work with other utilities that are currently implementing these systems to gain a stronger understanding of the costs and benefits of these WBICs.

7.11 Rain Barrels

Rain barrels reduce potable water use by substituting collected rainwater for landscape irrigation. Union County's rain barrel program includes promoting rain barrels for use by current customers and other County residents. Water conservation staff develop partnerships with other organizations (e.g., the NC Green Industry Council, Master Gardners, local home improvement stores) to promote the purchase and use of rain barrels. County staff also works in partnership with others to lead free workshops and provide free instruction on rain barrel installation, use, and maintenance. The County offers a \$20 rebate on all rain barrels purchased by current customers (up to a maximum of 2 per customer and up to a total of 500 per year).

7.12 Bulk Potable Water Use

UCPW registers individuals and firms who utilize bulk potable water from the County via hydrant hook-up for agricultural purposes, pool filling, paving, dust control, street cleaning, or other uses. These individuals and companies report on a voluntary basis the

7.13 Rein Senson

As of January 1, 2008, all times based irrigation systems are required to have rain sensors that deactivate the irrigation system after a %-inch of rain has faller. This requirement is outlined in the County's Water Conservation Ordinance. The rain sensors are used to eliminate water waste through unnecessary outdoor irrigation. The

Water Conservation Coordinator shall have the authority to establish enforcement parameters for failure of irrigation systems to comply with this requirement. In addition, UCPW develops partnerships with other organizations (e.g., local home improvement stores, NC Green industry Council, and landscaping contractors) to offer these units for sale. Union County offers a \$10 rebate on air rain sensors purchased by current customers (up to a total of 1,000 per year).



7.14 Separate Irrigation Meters

As required by the state of North Carolina, new irrigation systems installed after July 1, 2009, must be equipped with separate irrigation meters. This requirement facilitates evaluation of water use within the Union County system.

7.15 Fixture Rebates

Inside water use efficiency is directly related to plumbing fixture type and customer ochaviors. Various elements of this Program are designed to modify customer behavior to more efficient water use. The audit program is designed to offer more efficient plumbing devices such as faucet aerators and shower heads – in particular for older structures

Significant water savings can also be realized in larger water use equipment. During the 5 year implementation plan, Union County will develop and offer partial rebates for the following equipment.

8.1 Flushing Program Development

UCPW routinery conducts flushing of certain areas in the water distribution system that may be experiencing taste and/or odor issues, or where necessary for regulatory compliance. During these flushing events, large volumes of water are discharged from the system Unused.

The Water Conservation Program puts in place a system to monitor, measure, and optimize UCPW's flushing program. The Water Conservation Coordinator, working closery with the Public Works Director, develops a flushing optimization program. In addition, the Water Conservation Coordinator partners with local fire departments to develop a plan that monitors, measures, and optimizes water used in fire department exercises.

8.2 Leak Detection and Repair Program

9.0 Personnel

Successful implementation of the U₂C Program requires dedicated staff. Water conservation efforts have historically been shared among UCPW staff. However, in order to meet the Program objectives and froll outfall of the Program elements, then the addition of personnel is needed. Given the current economic climate and the need to prepare basic elements of the Water Conservation Program, efforts during Year 1 of the Program shall be shared among existing Public Works staff. 10.0 Schedule and Budget

Overall Program goals have been outlined in Section 6.0. A detailed implementation schedule with milestones and other performance metrics are included in Table 5 attached. The overall Water Conservation Program is designed for phased implementation of personnel, costs, and conservation initiatives.

The Water Conservation Program budget ranges from \$30,000 (in Year 1) to \$275,000 (in Year 5); where much of the budgeted costs are for personnel, rebate programs, public education materials, and the water audit program.

11.0 Program Tracking and Updates

Metrics related to the Water Conservation Program will be tracked to evaluate the amount of water saved and the cost-effectiveness of the various Program elements. Metrics to be tracked on an annual basis include:

- Performance metrics listed in Section 6.0.
- Water use profile.
- Number of hardware/equipment units provided or rebates given.
- Number of audits completed.
- Number of people attending workshops or education sessions.
- Number of events sponsored or where displays/exhibits completed.
- Estimated amount of water saved based on hardware/equipment units put in place.

The Water Conservation Program is dynamic and is expected to change over time. Each year the Water Conservation Coordinator working with the Public Works Director shall review the Program and make recommendations for revision. In addition, an annual update of the Program's initiatives, accomplishments, milestones, and challenges will be presented to the Board of County Commissioners.
