BACKGROUND: At the December 4, 2007 regular scheduled Planning Board meeting, the Planning Board recommended amending Section 15 to add a defintion of "Retail Establishment" and delete terms and related definitions of "Shopping Center, Class A" and "Shopping Center, Class B"; Section 180N to replace subsection h with "Hours of Operations"; and Section 146 to replace "Retail Sales", "Retail Sales Misc", and "Shopping Genter - Class A and B" with "Retail Establishments or Shopping Centers" according the amount of total florr area: less than 25,000 square feet (sq ft), 25,000-50,000 sq ft, 50,001-120,000 sq ft and greater than 120,000 sq ft. The Planning Board voted 7 to 0 to recommend these text amendments. The proposed text amendments are consistent with the adopted Union County Land Use Plan.

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO UNION COUNTY LAND USE ORDINANCE DECEMBER, 2007

#### 1. Section 15 - Definition of Basic Terms

Retail Establishment: A building, property, use or activity, the principal purpose of which is the sale of goods, products, or merchandise directly to the consumer. Any use that could be classified as a Retail Establishment but also could be classified as another use within the Table of Uses (e.g., Variety Store) and that has a total floor area of at least 25,000 square feet shall be considered solely a Retail Establishment and not such other use (e.g., Variety Store) when determining whether that use is permitted in a particular zoning district.

2. <u>Shopping Centers:</u> A group of two (2) or more retail establishments-uses constructed and developed in one (1) or more phrases with customer and employee parking and merchandise and other loading facilities provided on-site. A shopping center may be located and developed on one (1) or more lots and may include one (1) or more principal buildings.

Shopping Center, Class A: A shopping center containing up to one hundred twenty thousand (120,000) square feet of gross leasable area.

Shopping Center, Class B: A shopping center containing over (120,000) square feet of gross leasable area.

3. The title of Section 180N shall be changed to the following:

## <u>Section 180N - Shopping Centers and Retail Establishments Exceeding 50,000 sq ft of total floor area</u>

4. The first sentence of Section 180N shall be replaced with the following:

A Shopping Center, as defined in Article II, Section 15 or for those retail sales

Establishments which exceeds 50,000 sq./ft. of total floor area.

Shopping Centers and Retail Establishments which exceed 50,000 square feet of total floor area shall comply with the requirements of this Section.

#### h. Consideration of hours of operation

- 5. Subsection h. of Section 180N, shall be replaced with the following:
  - h. Hours of operation. Hours of operation shall be limited to between 6:00 AM and 11:00 PM for any building (including related outdoor sales area) of a Shopping Center or Retail Establishment within 200 feet of a property with a single-family residence and for any building where the primary parking area for said building is within 200 feet of a property with a single-family residence. If the development consists of one Retail Establishment or Shopping Center with only one building, the hours of operation will be limited to between 6:00 AM and 11:00 PM if a building or any parking area is within 200 feet of a property with a single-family residence. This 200 foot distance shall be measured from the closest point on the property line of the lot with the single-family residence to the closest part of each separate building or primary parking area for said building of the Shopping Center or Retail Establishment.
- 6. Delete from the Table of Uses (Section 147) the following uses: "Retail Sales (total floor area greater than 50,000 sq/ft)", "Retail Sales Misc", "Shopping Center Class A (up to 25,000 120,000 sq. ft.)",

The following is from the Union County Planning Board meeting that was held on Tuesday, December 4, 2007:

#### ITEM NUMBER FIVE

Land Use Ordinance Text Amendments – Section 15 Definitions, Section 180N Shopping Center, and Section 146 Table of Uses

Richard Black, Interim County Manager/Planning Division Director, reviewed with the Planning Board with proposed Text Amendment changes. Mr. Black said that in Section 15, it was being proposed to add a definition of retail establishments. He noted that the word "use" would replace the word "establishment" in the definition of Shopping Center and the terms Shopping Center A (up to 120,000 sq ft) and Shopping Center B (greater than 120,000 sq. ft.) would be deleted. Mr. Black also pointed out that subsection h. of Section 180N would be replaced with specific standards for regulating hours of operation and the Table of Uses (Section 147) would be amended to reflect retail establishments and shopping centers based on their amount of total floor area.

Motion was made by Robert Allen and seconded by Russell Cox to send to the Board of County Commissioners, with a vote of 7 to 0, to add the definition for retail establishments, deleting the general retail categories such as miscellaneous retail sales, retail sales in a single building greater than 50,000 sq. ft., Shopping Center, Class A up to 120,000 sq ft., Shopping Centers, Class B over 120,000 sq. ft. and putting retail establishments or shopping centers into four categories, being regulated by their size; less than 25,000 sq ft., 25,000-50,000 sq. ft., 50,001-120,000 sq. ft., and greater than 120,000 sq. ft. of total floor area.

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO UNION COUNTY LAND USE ORDINANCE DECEMBER, 2007

Add to the Table of Uses (Section147) the following uses: "Retail Establishments or Shopping Centers less than 25,000 sg ft of total floor area Permitted by Right in B-1, B-2, B-3, B-4, and HC Zoning Districts", "Retail Establishments or Shopping Centers, 25,000 - 50,000 sq ft of total floor area require a Special Use Permit in B-1 and B-2 and Permitted by Right in B-4, and HC Zoning Districts", "Retail Establishments or Shopping Centers, 50,001 - 120,000 sq ft of total floor area require a Special Use Permit with Supplemental Regulations specified in Section 180N in B-1, B-2, and B-4 and Permitted by Right in HC Zoning Districts". and "Retail Establishments or Shopping Centers greater than 120,000 sq ft of total floor area require a Special Use Permit with Supplemental Regulations specified in Section 180N in B-4 and Permitted by Right in HC Zoning Districts". Parking requirements for all of the above uses have the same requirement - 1 space per 400 square feet of gross floor area.

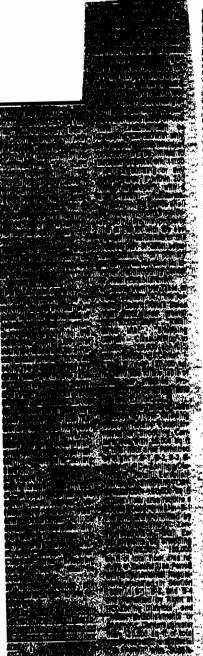

Thanks so much for meeting with the Stewart team last week in order to clarify the Scope of Services and the County's expectations for this project. Based upon that meeting and the other materials that you and your staff have provided, we offer the following Project Description, Scope of Services/Project Approach and Fees for this project:

#### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION:**

This project, known as Phase 1 Jesse Helms Park Passive Area, will consist of an ingress/egress over Flag Branch Creek in order to connect the existing Agricultural Center facility to the rest of the park, which is currently undeveloped. Thus, this phase of the project will consist of the following improvements:

- Extension of a two way road from the existing parking lot behind the Agricultural Center to the creek. This driveway will be designed to accommodate all types of vehicular traffic including bicycles, cars, emergency and construction vehicles.
- 2. The design of a trail between the existing parking lot to the bridge in order to accommodate pedestrian traffic.
- Design of a bridge or culvert across Flag Branch Creek. This bridge will also be designed to accommodate pedestrians, blcycles, cars, horse trailers, emergency and construction vehicles. There will be a driveway terminus that will extend approximately 50 feet beyond the creek.

The funding for this project is \$499,000.00 including all A/E services and fees.

#### SCOPE OF SERVICES/PROJECT APPROACH:

The following describes the Scope of Services anticipated for this project which also translates to our proposed project approach:

#### **PRE-DESIGN SERVICES:**

- 1. Surveying Services to include field verification and mapping of the following areas:
  - -A topographic and existing conditions survey of the existing parking from the edge of pavement to 200 linear feet up the existing drive towards the Agricultural Center.



- -A 100 foot wide topographic corridor survey from the existing parking lot to 200 linear feet beyond Flag Branch Creek.
- -Elevation and Cross Sections of the creek at the estimated center line of the bridge and at 25, 100, 200 and 300 feet upstream and 25, 100 and 200 feet downstream from the estimated bridge location.
- -An existing conditions survey of the box culverts beneath Presson Road.

This survey will include existing topography at 1 foot contour intervals and field locate and map existing trees 12 inch caliper and greater within the 100 foot wide road and bridge corridor.

#### 2. Geotechnical Services:

See attached Proposal from Terracon dated October 18, 2007.

#### **DESIGN SERVICES:**

- Hydrologic Study/Bridge Design (Stewart/Raleigh):
  - A. Functional Design Activity will begin by assembling and studying all available project information including environmental documents, surveys and FEMA documents. Once additional concerns are identified, a site visit will be made to further evaluate constraints and opportunities. Roadway concepts will begin with establishment of preliminary horizontal and vertical alignments and tabulation of design criteria. Studies will be made between alternate designs to minimize project cost. Bridge concepts will then be developed for the purpose of hydraulic analysis. The vertical roadway alignment will then be rnodified in response to the bridge concepts.

With respect to the environmental process, streams and any wetland boundaries will be delineated and coordinated with the Army Corps of Engineers early in the process. At the completion of functional design a permit application will be developed for submittal to the Army Corps of Engineers and NCDENR DWO.

- B. Hydraulic Design All available USGS and FEMA data will be assembled and studied. It is anticipated that the project will require hydraulics, erosion control, permits and water quality measures. The project footprint is in a FEMA Detailed Study area. The floodway is within the design limits for a majority of the project. The location of the stream and its floodway presents challenges for the hydraulic engineer, and will require tight coordination with the roadway and bridge engineers. The impact of the proposed crossing will be studied with the FEMA model in mind. Span arrangements, bridge width, roadway alignment (vertical and horizontal), and fill limits will be scrutinized to minimize impacts. The design shall maintain a functioning level as to not present potential of damage due to flooding for the highway or adjacent properties.
- C. Preliminary Bridge and Roadway Alternatives Early coordination within the Design Team and Union County Parks & Recreation will determine the controlling parameters for the stream crossing. Initial tasks will involve identifying optional bridge types, pler locations, span lengths, the roadway typical section and alternate vertical alignments. Establishing these parameters early in project development will eliminate late-stage variations, which can



have significant effects on the project schedule. The bridge typical section will be designed to accommodate pedestrian and bicycle traffic and Stewart will prepare estimates of probable construction costs for the top two bridge choices.

Studies will be made between alternate designs to develop comparative pros and cons for each. Upon evaluating the functional designs the preferred alternate will be determined. The horizontal and vertical alignments as well as the design criteria from the functional design phase will be refined. HEC RAS models for pre and post conditions will be established as required to provide the appropriate hydraulic opening.

The preliminary design is expected to Include two alternates. The profile is anticipated to be different for each bridge type. The roadway profile will also be extended beyond the construction limits for the purpose of extending the roadway at a later date. Also, while it will be our objective to avoid reconstruction of the existing roadway doing so is likely to take extra effort. Alternate crest vertical curve and grades will be developed to identify a preferred solution that responds to existing conditions, but also the desired pedestrian and bicycle access.

D. Final Bridge and Roadway Design/Construction Documents – The final bridge design will include foundations, substructure, and superstructure including railings and aesthetic treatment. Roadway and lateral ditches, if required, will be designed for stability and appropriate erosion protection measures. Water quality will be evaluated to minimize the impact to the stream ecosystems by implementing Stormwater Best Management Practices. This Phase of Services will also include permitting.

#### Assumptions:

- Two bridge type alternates will be developed thru Functional Design. For the purpose of fee and scope proposals one is assumed to be a three span cored slab structure up to 100 feet in length. The second alternate will be a single span prefabricated structure.
- Aesthetic treatment while desirable will be ilmited due to budget. Aesthetic treatment is anticipated on the bridge rails while maintaining AASHTO standards.
- Alternate roadway vertical profiles will be developed for the purpose of responding to bridge options and hydraulic analysis.
- Crest and sag vertical curves are anticipated due to the site characteristics and elevation drop.
- Roadway design will be for a two lane section with unpaved shoulders. The roadway will extend from the parking lot of the Ag Center to point approximately 50 feet beyond the bridge.



- Pedestrian and bicycle access will be accommodated on the bridge. Beyond the limits of the bridge pedestrian trails will be recognized as part of the ultimate design. Due to budget constraints they will not be part of Phase I.
- Modifications to NC Flood Mapping is outside the anticipated scope of work.

#### **POST DESIGN SERVICES:**

#### Bid Phase:

Upon completion of the Construction Documents and Permitting Phase, Stewart will assist the Owner with the Bid Phase of this project. We will Advertise the project for Bid, prepare the standard Bid Form and attend a Pre-Bid meeting and the Bid Opening, as well as answer questions from contractors and prepare necessary addenda. Once the bids have been received, we will evaluate/certify the bids and make a recommendation to award the contract. We will assist Union County Park and Recreation prepare a contract to the Contractor awarded the project.

This project will be bid as a typical Design/Bid/Construct to a Single Prime Contractor.

#### 2. Construction Administration Services:

- A. Stewart Engineering shall provide construction observation and other construction related services on an as needed, or as requested basis, during the construction process. This Scope of Services estimates that construction will be completed in 6 months from award of the construction contract. Work will generally include review of shop drawing submittals, a maximum of 8 to 10 site observation visits and reports for the site related improvements, attendance at construction meetings during normal site visits, and preparation of project close out documents and punch lists for sitework related items and the construction of the bridge which will be completed by Stewart's Special Inspections Department.

#### 1.0 Payments on Account

- 1.1 Invoices for Stewart Engineering, Inc.'s (SEI) services shall be submitted, at SEI's option, either upon completion of any phase of service or on a monthly basis. Invoices shall be payable when rendered and shall be considered PAST DUE if not paid within 30 days after the invoice date.
- 1.2 Any inquiry or questions concerning the substance or content of an invoice shall be made to SEI in writing within 10 days of receipt of the invoice. A failure to notify SEI within this period shall constitute an acknowledgment that the service has been provided and is correct.

#### 2.0 Late Payments

- 2.1 A service charge will be charged at the rate of 1.5% (18% annual percentage rate) per month or the maximum allowable by law on the then outstanding balance of PAST DUE accounts. In the event any portion of an account remains unpaid 90 days after billing, the Client shall pay all costs of collection, including reasonable attorney's fees.
- 2.2 In the event that any portion of an account remains unpaid 30 days after billing, SEI may, without waiving any claim or right against the Client, and without liability whatsoever to the Client, suspend or terminate the performance of all services.

#### 3.0 Insurance

- 4.2 SEI shall indemnify and hold harmless the Client and its personnel from and against any and all claims, damages, losses, and expenses (including reasonable attorney's fees) to the extent they are caused by the negligent act, error, or omissions by SEI in performance of its services under this Agreement, subject to the provisions in the paragraph below on Risk Aliocation.
- 4.3 Sub-Consultant(s) shall indemnify & hold harmless Consultant & Client from and against all claims, losses, damages, and expenses (including attorney's fees and defense costs) to the extent such claims, losses, damages, or expenses are caused by any negligent act, error, or



omission of Sub-Consultant or any person or organization for whom the Sub-Consultant is legally liable.

#### 5.0 Risk Allocation

5.1 In recognition of the relative risks, rewards and benefits of the Project to both the Client and SEI, the risks have been allocated such that the Client agrees that, to the fullest extent permitted by law, SEI's total liability to the Client for any and all injuries, claims, losses, expenses, damages or claim expenses rising out of this Agreement, from any cause or causes, shall not exceed the amount of \$250,000. Such causes include, but are not limited to, SEI's negligence, errors, omissions, strict liability, breach of contract or breach of warranty.

#### 6.0 Reuse of Documents

They are and shall remain the property of SEI. Any reuse without written approval or adaptation by SEI is prohibited.

#### 7.0 Opinion of Probable Construction Costs

7.1 SEI's opinion of probable construction costs, if rendered as a service under this Agreement, is based on assumed labor costs and approximate quantities of material and equipment, and therefore is of a conditional character. SEI cannot guarantee the cost of work to be performed by others since market or bidding conditions can change at any time and changes in the scope or quality of the Project may affect estimates.

#### 8.0 Mediation

8.1 The parties hereby agree that, they shall endeavor to resolve their claims by mediation which, unless the parties mutually agree otherwise, shall be in accordance with the construction industry mediation rules of the American Arbitration Association. Once a dispute or claim has arisen between the parties, mediation shall be conducted as soon as practicable. Either party may request mediation to any claims or disputes, at any time, by serving the other party with a written request for mediation setting forth the claim(s) or dispute(s) that are to be the subject of the mediation. The parties shall share any mediator fees and any filling fees equally. In addition, any agreement reached in mediation shall be enforceable as a binding settlement agreement in any court having jurisdiction over such agreement.

#### 9.0 Reimbursable Expenses

9.1 Reimbursable expenses will be billed at 1.10 times direct cost in addition to the lump sum and hourly fees above. Reimbursables shall include in house printing and plotting, reproductions, deliveries, and mileage for site visits and meetings.

Terracon Consultants, Inc. (Terracon) is pleased to submit this proposal for a subsurface exploration and geotechnical evaluation at the above referenced project. The following sections outline the project information and our suggested scope of services, schedule, and fees. This proposal is based on our meeting with Union County Parks and Recreation on October 11, 2007, and our site visit on the same day, as well as our experience with similar projects.

#### A. PROJECT INFORMATION

We understand that the Jesse Helms Park project will encompass approximately 145 acres of wooded and open space, including Flag Branch Creek. The project will include development of the park infrastructure. Phase I of the project is limited to pedestrian, vehicular and emergency ingress/egress over Flag Branch Creek.

Because of the preliminary nature of the project the type of structure, loads, and final grades were not known at the time of this proposal. However, based on our discussions, we anticipate that a one to three-span bridge will be required over Flag Branch Creek and will include roadway from the existing parking area to the north side of the bridge and approximately 35 feet of roadway on the south side.

Based on our site visit it appears that the site is moderately wooded. The ground elopes downward from the existing parking lot to the creek and is relatively flat on the other side. At the time of our site visit the creek was dry.

#### **B. SCOPE OF SERVICES**

#### Site Access

The client shall provide the right-of-entry to conduct the exploration at the subject property. The attached Access Agreement should be signed and returned if the client is not the property owner.

#### **Boring Location**

The following services will be performed to locate and access the borings at the project site:

- Terracon will contact North Carolina One Call regarding location of public utility lines at the
  project site to prevent conflict between boring locations and existing utilities. The utility
  locator service generally requires 48 hours to locate utilities.
- Terracon personnel will fayout the borings by pacing distances and estimating right angles from available site features.
- Based on our site visit, the boring locations appear to be accessible to ATV mounted drilling equipment with some hand clearing; however a buildozer may be needed to clear trees and brush and to level ground depending on the location of the borings.
- If an existing topographic survey with site features is provided to Terracon, the boring elevations can be estimated. If more accurate elevations are required, it will be necessary to survey the borings. Surveying the borings is not included in the scope of services of this proposal, but can be performed for an additional cost.

If there are additional restrictions or special requirements regarding boring locations and site conditions, they should be brought to our attention prior to commencing the subsurface exploration.

#### Subsurface Exploration

Based on our discussions and site visit, Terracon proposes the following subsurface exploration:

• Terracon proposes to advance ten soil test borings at the project site. Split-barrel samples, four in the top 10 feet and one sample every 5 feet for the remaining depth of the boring, will be obtained from each boring. The borings will extend to the maximum proposed depths or auger refusal, whichever occurs first. If auger refusal is encountered before the required boring depth is obtained, borings may be offset 5 to 10 feet to determine if the refusal material is an isolated boulder or bedrock.

- The ten borings will be advanced as follows:
  - -Eight borings will be advanced in the area of the substructure foundations, two at each substructure location. The borings will be advanced to 25 feet below existing grades to determine the bearing characteristics of the subsurface materials. If auger refusal is encountered in the upper ten feet at abutment locations, up to two borings will be rock cored to a length of 10-ft each.
  - -Two borings will be advanced in the roadway approaches to 10 feet below existing grades to determine the pavement support characteristics of the soils below the paved areas.
- Groundwater level observations will be made at most boring locations during the drilling operations and at selected locations at 24-hours after boring completion in order to obtain stabilized groundwater levels.

Subsurface conditions may be encountered which would merit alteration of the field boring and/or sampling programs described above. We will contact you to notify you of any changes and to authorize alterations which could increase the proposed fee.

#### Laboratory Testing

Selected soil samples will be tested in our laboratory to determine physical engineering characteristics. Testing will be performed under the direction of a geotechnical engineer and will be performed in general accordance with applicable ASTM standards. For this project and the anticipated subsurface conditions, the following testing program is proposed:

- Four moisture content tests to determine the in-place moisture content of the material.
- Two Wash No. 200 Sieve Tests to determine the percentage of fines to assist in soils classification.
- Two Atterberg Limits Tests to identify the material types for further classification and determine the materials behavior relative to moisture content.
- One CBR test to determine the subgrade support for roadway pavement design.

#### **Engineering Report**

The results of the field and laboratory studies will be combined into an engineering report presenting Terracon's analyses, comments and geotechnical recommendations to guide design and construction of the bridge foundations and roadway pavement. Three bound copies and one electronic PDF copy of the report will be provided. The report will include the following:

- Plan of borings, logs of borings, groundwater observations and laboratory test results.
- Presentation of geologic profiles based on borings with a discussion of the general subsurface conditions including bedrock, soil, and groundwater conditions.
- Recommendations for suitable bridge foundation(s) with recommended allowable bearing
  pressures and estimated total and differential settlements of foundations supported in natural
  soils.
- Recommendations for site subgrade preparation to include suitable fill types, subgrade preparation for general site grading.
- Seismic site class in general accordance with Table 1615.1.1 of the 2006 NCSBC (if requested);
- Observed location of groundwater and recommended dewatering methods (if applicable).
- Roadway pavement thickness design of typical section consisting of asphalt concrete and base course with recommended North Carolina Department of Transportation specified materials.

#### C. SCHEDULE

The following schedule is anticipated from the date of authorization to proceed to complete the scope of services provided herein:

- Approximately 5 to 10 business days (days) to commence the fieldwork
- Approximately 3 to 5 days are expected to be required for completion of the field work.
- An additional 10 days will be required for the completion of laboratory testing, engineering analyses and preparation of the final report and recommendations.

The completed geotechnical engineering report can be presented about 4 to 5 weeks after notice to proceed is received. Verbal recommendations can be provided as required up to 2 days after completion of the field exploration.

#### D. COMPENSATION

The scope of geotechnical services provided herein will be provided for an estimated fee of \$6,800.00. This estimated fee assumes only hand clearing will be required for site access. An additional fee of \$800 will be incurred, if a buildozer is required to access boring locations.

If any of these items are not performed or altered from the proposed quantity, the estimated fee will be adjusted accordingly. Should it be necessary to expand our services beyond those outlined in this proposal, we will notify you, then send a supplemental proposal stating the additional services and fee.

#### **E. AUTHORIZATION**

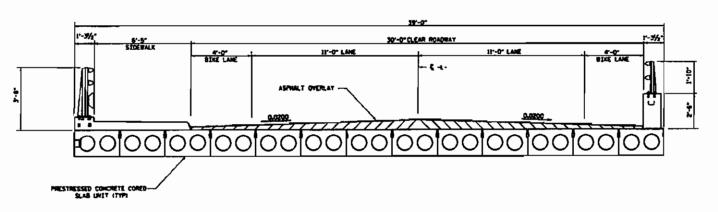

**DEPARTMENT'S RECOMMENDED ACTION:** (i) Approve the purchase of radio equipment from Motorola in the amount of \$7,641,410 (for a 7-tower system) or \$8,570,820 (for an 8-tower system, if necessary) pursuant to the sole source exception to formal bidding [G.S. 143-129(e)(6)]; and (ii) Authorize the County Manager to approve the contract with Motorola.

**BACKGROUND:** The 800-Mghz Radio Project was approved in the May 2007 CIP with an estimated total infrastructure cost of \$14,867,400. In October 2007, the BOCC formalized cost sharing participation in the capital and maintenance costs of the Radio Project infrastructure and subscriber units. Infrastructure costs were estimated at approximately \$10.9 million (land, towers, buildings, equipment) with equipment estimated at \$8.1 million. The annual additional cost of deploying the Radio Project was esimated at \$2,469,000 with a tax rate implication of 1.45 cents.

This radio system is estimated to be a seven tower site project providing emergency and nonemergency communication and paging coverage throughout the county. Three existing tower sites will be used. The total infrastructure cost is broken down into Part A, tower site selection, surveys, and purchasing of land for four tower sites; Part B, constructing 4 towers; Part C, installation of new equipment on seven towers and other infrastructure requirements for the system.

Here is an update on the project and refined actual and estimated cost of the overall project:

A portion of Part A was funded in August for \$59,110. This provided survey costs for three of the four new tower sites. The fourth tower site cannot be selected and surveyed until these

three sites are finalized. Also, all three of these land sites are land provided from the school system, therefore, saving the County the cost to purchase these sites. The fourth site located somewhere in the New Salem area will probably require the County to purchase approximately 1-2 acres of land.

Part B is estimated to cost approximately \$2.5 million. This is a high end estimate because we will not know the actual construction costs until we start site preparation.

Part C is the bulk of the cost of the Radio Project. Initially, the high end estimate was approximately \$12 million and was included in the May 2007 CIP and subsequently revised to \$8.1 million in October 2007. There were so many variables that we gave the board a high end estimate so that should there be any surprises, they would be all good surprises from a taxpayer's perspective. The cost of infrastructure for Motorola equipment that will go on seven towers is \$7,641,410. This price includes a discount of \$200,000 if the County signs the contract by December 28, 2007. This contract also provides for a fixed cost of \$929,410 for equiping the eighth tower site (if necessary). The revised estimate for Part C is now \$7,641,410.

The new cost estimate for the infrastructure of this radio system is now \$9,147,410 (as compared to October 2007's \$10.9 million) if the system stays as a seven tower system. The cost will increase by an estimated \$1,709,000 (to purchase land, build a tower and \$929,410 worth of equipment that would go on this tower) if we must build an equip an eighth tower site for a total of \$12,061,720.

Of note, staff is required to justify why this project qualifies for a single source purchase with Motorola. First of all, there are only two vendors in this field in the nation capable of building an 800 Mghz radio system; Motorola and MA-COM. Based on previous decisions made by the Board of County Commissioners in April 2006 and January 2007, Union County has decided to partner with Charlotte/Mecklenburg and Gaston County to create a regional radio system. To refresh your memory, the primary driving factor in this decision is the fact that only Charlotte/Mecklenburg owns the necessary radio frequencies to allow us to build an 800 Mghz radio system for the foreseeable future. Otherwise, we would not be able to build a radio system for a number of years if we had to obtain frequencies on our own. The Charlotte/Mecklenburg system is a Motorola based system. Since Motorola system products and a MA-COM system products are NOT compatable, we are required to go with a Motorola system to be part of the Charlotte/Mecklenburg radio system. Finally, the Department of Homeland Security grants that we have received through the Charlotte Urban Area Strategic Initiative (UASI) requires us to only purchase Motorola radios to be interoperable with the regional radio system. As you can see, we either go in with Charlotte/Mecklenburg which restricts us to the Motorola based system or we do without a new radio system until we can obtain sufficient number of radio frequencies, which are currently not available and could take years to obtain if we can get them at all.

Finally, in cooperation with Charlotte/Mecklenburg and Gaston County, per your prior approval at two previous board meetings, Union County has submitted for two new Federal grants to help pay for the infrastructure cost of this project. This grant will hopefully be awarded this month. Union County is requesting approximately \$4 million of Federal grant money. This grant requires a match by the County. Our match will be paid entirely by the money we will have paid Motorola with your approval of their contract. The overall cost of the project will be reduced by any amount we may receive from this grant. Obviously, we should not count on receiving any

grant money, but the timing of these two grant opportunities could not be more fortutious.

LEGAL DEPARTMENT COMMENTS: Pursuant to G.S. 143-129(e)(6), the local governing body can except from the statutory purchasing provisions:

"Purchases of apparatus, supplies, materials, or equipment when: (i) performance or price competition for a product are not available; (ii) a needed product is available from only one source of supply; or (iii) standardization or compatibility is the overriding consideration. Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, the governing board of a political subdivision of the State shall approve the purchases listed in the preceding sentence prior to the award of the contract."

Pat Beekman has provided the justification for sole source purchase in the preceding sections of this Abstract.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Nothing is due upon signing the contract. 50% is required to be paid to Motorola when the Custumer Design Review (CDR) documents are signed by both Motorola and Union County (hopefully within the next 3 to 6 months) with remaining due upon various milestones reached in the contract. Staff has negotiaited an out to this contract in the unlikely event that we do not have an approved interlocal aggreement with Charlotte/Mecklenburg or we cannot secure zoning for the siting of the towers.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT COMMENTS: The BOCC's October 2007 action was based on infrastruction cost at \$10.9 million with a total Radio Project impact of \$2,468,999 and 1.45 cents on the property tax rate. If the Radio Project can be deployed with 7 towers, the fiscal impact costs can be reduced to \$2,397,436 or 1.41 cents. An eight tower Radio Project will increase the fiscal impact to \$2,618,842 or 1.54 cents.

**DEPARTMENT'S RECOMMENDED ACTION:** Adopt Capital Project Ordinance #91

**BACKGROUND:** In December 2005 and February 2006, the County and UCPS identified eight elementary school classroom wing addition projects. The classroom addition projects were intended to take advantage of higher core capacity (media and cafeteria) at several elementary schools. The system completed projects at seven schools - Antioch, Kensington, Porter Ridge. Sandy Ridge, Shiloh, Weddington and Waxhaw. The remaining school, Marvin ES was deferred to a subsequent planning period.

The UCPS, subject to approval by the BOCC, has awarded the construction bid on the Marvin ES classroom project in the amount of \$1,467,900. The construction bid is within the approved budget contained in the CIP2006.

The project will construct 6 additional classrooms providing additional capacity of approximately 134 students.

The 2006 CIP contains funds for UCPS project administration in connection with the capital improvement program. A portion of the costs are reflected in the UCPS annual current expense appropriation with the balance coming from CIP sources.

# Change Order G-5 Phase IV Government Center Itemized Explanation of Changes

#### Item #1

Included with this Phase is the replacement of the sidewalk in front of the Government Center that spans between the building basement and an existing retaining wall. This sidewalk had started sinking for reasons that we did not know at the time of bid. The construction drawings included the replacement of that sidewalk and some provisions, including concrete piles, intended to help support a new sidewalk on less than perfect sub-soil.

However, the actual condition of the subsoil that was discovered after the existing sidewalk demolition was far worse than we had hoped. Thus the solution proposed in the construction drawings had to be modified to address the subsoil problem.

The soil was tested and a recommendation for undercut and fill as well as soil compaction was made by the Geo-technical engineer. Re-condition the subsoil per the Geo-technical engineer's recommendation did not prove cost-effective.

Instead, we proposed a couple of alternate solutions that were more economical. The least expensive solution was to change the design of the sidewalk to be a structural slab that spans between the basement and the retaining wall. This design requires additional re-inforcing and 2 additional inches of concrete.

Also included with this cost is the installation of new drainage piping which we had hoped to re-use. Unfortunately the existing piping was damaged and had to be replaced with a new system.

#### I. Scope of Work:

The North Carolina Division of Public Health (NCDPH) announces plans to provide continued Pandemic Influenza funding to North Carolina's 85 local health departments (LHDs). During Pandemic Influenza "Phase I and II" periods, LHDs completed pandemic influenza preparedness self assessments, performed gap analyses based on these self-assessments and submitted requests for funding based on gap analyses, and developed plans for preventing excess morbidity, mortality and societal disruption. LHDs submitted their plans for review and approval using a two-step process. Review criteria included sufficient planning to address the "Essential Elements" of pandemic influenza plans developed in collaboration with the UNC Center for Public Health Preparedness, consistency with State pandemic planning, and for evidence of collaborative planning with schools within each LHD's jurisdiction.

North Carolina's Public Health Emergency Preparedness application for 2007-2008 includes funding for NC LHDs to further accomplish and extend ongoing efforts that focus on Priorities and Critical Tasks identified by CDC. CDC and North Carolina preparedness priorities for the current funding include: 1) Pandemic preparedness planning, 2) Mass prophylaxis, 3) Community Containment (formerly Isolation and Quarantine), and 4) Communication. CDC Goals related to these priorities include Prevention, Detection and Reporting, Investigation, Control and Improvement. Activities supported by this funding are:

A) Revision of Pandemic Influenza plans using recommendations provided through Phase II planning technical assistance and review, including incorporation of content in reviews by the UNC Center for Public Health Preparedness and the Division of Public Health into LHD pandemic plans. Funding may be used to support activities to address recommendations, e.g. convening meetings with or continuing to cultivate relationships with partners in LHD jurisdictions that may not have been as active in earlier planning processes.

- B) Development and/or enhancement of planning content specifically related to school and childcare dismissal to meet a new "Essential Elements" guide for this specific focus area.
- C) PHPR requires LHDs to carry out the next steps of exercising pandemic flu plans or components of plans. By SFY 2008-09, all exercises will be conducted using the Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP) framework. Evaluation of the components of the pandemic flu plans such as community containment, communications, can be used to fulfill the annual exercise requirements.

Local Health Ofrector Signature and Date

Those counties (Buncombe, Cumberland, Guilford, Mecklenburg, New Hanover, Pitt, Wake) who are host to the Public Health Regional Surveillance Teams (PHRST) will receive funding specifically for the following activities. Fund and activity reporting shall occur according to the process defined in Agreement Addendum 513.

- a. Expected outputs from PHRST's:
- b. Participate in regional pandemic flu planning activities, such as community outreach, exercises and planning activities.
- c. Provide resources to Local Health Departments within the region to assist in local planning and exercises
- d. Serve as liaison between the state offices of PHP&R, GCDC, etc and the Local Health Departments to relay information.

The purpose of this Agreement Addendum is to document deliverables required for receipt of funding in SFY 07-08.

#### II. Performance Indicators and Benchmarks

- Pandemic Influenza funds may not be used to purchase antiviral drugs, seasonal influenza or pneumococcal vaccine, vehicles of any description or incentive items.
- Local health departments who receive pandemic preparedness funding are permitted to hire temporary staff in order to allow planning activities to proceed.
- 3. Public information projects must utilize approved pandemic influenza messages from NCDPH or CDC. Projects which deviate from existing NCDPH or CDC messages must receive prior approval from the NC Office of Public Health Preparedness and Response (PHP&R) to assure consistency with DPH Public Affairs Office materials. Requests for approval should be submitted to pandemicflu.plan@ncmail.net. Addition of county-specific information to public information messages (such as location of mass dispensing clinics, hours of operation, etc.) is acceptable without prior approval.
- 4. Purchase of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) is an approved activity. PPE must be purchased for and distributed only to defined priority populations as a control measure during a pandemic. PPE must meet appropriate NIOSH certification and be planned for use in ways consistent with latest OSHA and CDC Healthcare Infection Control Practices Advisory Committee guidelines and recommendations available from: <a href="http://www.osha.gov/index.html">http://www.osha.gov/index.html</a> and <a href="http://www.cdc.gov/ncidod/dhqp/hicpac.html">http://www.cdc.gov/ncidod/dhqp/hicpac.html</a>.
- 5. Revised LHD Pandemic Influenza Plans shall be sent to <a href="mailto:pandemicflu.plan@ncmail.net">pandemicflu.plan@ncmail.net</a> for review and maintenance. Assistance in developing pandemic influenza response plans will be made available. Local plans will remain on file in PHP&R.
- 6. As part of the community containment components of the LHD Pandemic Influenza Plans, joint planning with schools and childcare will address the potential for an eight to twelve week dismissal. Planning goals include continuity of services for children who receive specialized care while attending school or childcare critical to their well-being, e.g. subsidized meals; physical, occupational, or other therapies. Local Health Department Plans do not have to address continuity of the educational mission of schools, but should detail the following:
  - Communication plans between public health and school leadership;
  - Communication plans between public health and child care providers;
  - Communication plans for media during extended period of school and child care dismissal.

It is anticipated that local plans (from Public Health and/or other agencies) will provide for the continuity of critical services (education, social services and reduced/free meals) children receive in these settings that may be interrupted if children are dismissed from schools and child care.

7. Pandemic preparedness exercises are strongly encouraged during this interval to identify plan strengths and gaps. LHDs are encouraged to plan exercises in collaboration with existing partners including other government agencies such emergency management, neighboring jurisdictions, private sector businesses and non-governmental organizations such as Parent-Teacher-Student-Associations as well as media and to utilize the Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation

Program to the extent possible.. Regional or multi-jurisdiction exercises are strongly encouraged to assess and build consistency of preparedness planning and response across larger geographic areas. Assistance with exercise planning will be made available through PHP&R including PHRST teams.

- 8. LHDs will continue to provide educational awareness activities to increase the rate of annual flu vaccination of its community health care workers.
- 9. LHDs will continue to train staff in preparedness activities, including Incident Command System.
- Pandemic Influenza funds from CDC are non-recurring funds. Plans for use of this funding for long term staffing support are discouraged.
- 11. Pandemic Influenza funds may not be used to supplant any current local or state expenditures. The Public Health Service Act, Title I, Section 319c (e) (42 USC 247d-3(e)) specifically states "SUPPLEMENT NOT SUPPLANT funds appropriated under this section shall be used to supplement and not supplant other federal, state and local public funds provided for activities under this section".

#### III. Reporting Requirements

Accountability will be documented as evidenced by receipt of:

- 1. A revised Pandemic Influenza Preparedness Plan or Pandemic Influenza Preparedness Annex to an existing all-hazards plan sent to <u>pandemicflu.plan@ncmail.net</u> no later than May, 2008. Plans must include documentation of planning related to item 6 above.
  - a. Exception: If a plan was approved during Phase II without any recommendations from UNC CPHP or DPH for revision or improvement, an LHD may submit only content related to item 6 above.
- 2. Exercise Documentation:
  - Exercises can be used to fulfill one of the two exercises required under the Aid to County Grant for Public Health Preparedness (reference activity under Agreement Addendum 514).
  - b. After action report(s) (AAR) and Corrective Action Plans (CAP) shall be generated from efforts to exercise the Pandemic Influenza Preparedness Plan. These will be completed using the template supplied by PHP&R.
  - c. AARs must be sent to <u>pandemicflu.plan@ncmail.net</u>, <u>phillip.benson@ncmail.net</u>, and tammym.schneider@ncmail.net within 30 days of the exercise along with a Corrective Action Plan that addresses AAR findings.
- 3. Documentation of the total number of seasonal influenza vaccinations provided through the LHD during the 2007-2008 flu season sent to <a href="mailto:pandemicflu.plan@ncmail.net">pandemicflu.plan@ncmail.net</a>.
- Local (County) Health Department will submit monthly Expenditure Monitoring Reports (EMRs) to Tammy Schneider, Sub-recipient Grant Monitor at <a href="mailto:tammym.schneider@ncmail.net">tammym.schneider@ncmail.net</a> using the form provided by PHP&R.
- Quarterly Narrative Reporting (web based) by project staff are to be submitted to the Office of Public Health Preparedness & Response. Pandemic Flu activities should be noted in the text boxes of the QNR for any quarter with activities.

Special Note: Prior to purchasing equipment exceeding a \$2,500 invoice total, the Health Department must request approval in writing from the Office of Public Health Preparedness and Response (PHP&R). The request must be on Health Department Letterhead, signed by the Health Director. Any approval request sent to PHP&R will be reviewed within 5 business days. Should any questions arise, a clarification will be requested from the Health Director. Once the request has been reviewed and approved, the Health Director will receive a written approval from the PHP&R Office for the request. (Consolidated Agreement, Section B, 14.b. – Funding Stipulations)

IV. Consequences of inadequate performance (require corrective action plans, withhold payment, reduce or eliminate funding/payment)

All reasonable efforts will be recognized as attempts to complete the scope of work and to achieve the performance measures outlined above. However, inadequate performance on the part of a Local Health Department directly impacts the capacity of North Carolina's ability in overall preparedness. In the event that performance is inadequate, the Division reserves the right to identify the county as "at risk" with the implied special attention and resources applied to that designation.

While not necessarily an indicator of inadequate performance, any Local Health Department's inability to spend allocated funds within the specified effective period will result in a loss of those unspent funds.

The Family Planning and Reproductive Health Unit is making available additional Title X funding to local health departments and districts for family planning services for this fiscal year.

A total of \$416,752 is being distributed among all counties as bonus performance funds. The distribution includes a base amount for all counties and an additional amount determined by performance. Each county will receive at least \$833. Additionally, 50 counties will receive performance based "bonus" funds calculated on an increase in patient caseload. These funds may be used for any Title X approved expenditure, including purchase of additional contraceptives, PAP tests, purchase of multivitamins with folic acid and sterilizations.

IMPORTANT NOTE: The budgetary estimate for this Bonus funding is attached. Please note that the amount of "new monies" appears in the Proposed Allocation column in the spreadsheet on the right. The State Allocation column on the left indicates year-to-date Title X monies already in county budgets.

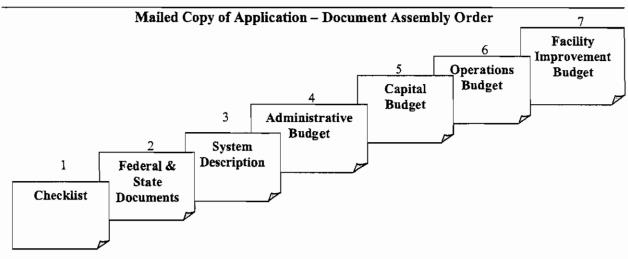

## Special Section 5333(b) Warranty For Application to the Rural and Small Urban Program

The following language shall be made part of the contract of assistance with the State or other public body charged with allocation and administration of funds provided under the Community Transportation Program (CTP):

#### A. General Application

The Public Body (The North Carolina Department of Transportation) agrees that in the absence of waiver by the U. S. Department of Labor, the terms and conditions of this warranty, as set forth below, shall apply for the protection of the transportation related employees of any employer providing transportation services assisted by the project,

#### UNION COUNTY

(Legal Name of Applicant) and the transportation related employees of any other surface public transportation providers in the transportation service area of the project.

The Public Body shall provide to the U. S. Department of Labor and maintain at all times during the Project an accurate, up-to-date listing of all existing transportation providers which are eligible Recipients of transportation assistance funded by the Project, in the transportation service area of the Project, and any labor organizations representing the employees of such providers.

Certification by the Public Body to the U. S. Department of Labor that the designated Recipients have indicated in writing acceptance of the terms and conditions of the warranty arrangement will be sufficient to permit the flow of CTP funding in the absence of a finding of noncompliance by the Department of Labor.

#### B. Standard Terms and Conditions

(1) The Project shall be carried out in such a manner and upon such terms and conditions as will not adversely affect employees of the Recipient and of any other surface public transportation provider in the transportation service area of the Project. It shall be an obligation of the Recipient and any other legally responsible party designated by the Public Body to assure that any and all transportation services assisted by the Project are contracted for and operated in such a manner that they do not impair the rights and interests of affected employees. The term "Project", as used herein, shall not be limited to the particular facility, service, or operation assisted by Federal funds, but shall include any changes, whether organizational, operational, technological, or otherwise, which are a result of the assistance provided. The phrase "as a result of the Project", shall when used in this arrangement, include events related to the Project occurring in anticipation of, during, and subsequent to the Project

and any program of efficiencies or economies related thereto; provided, however, that volume rises and falls of business, or changes in volume and character of employment brought about by causes other than the Project (including any economies or efficiencies unrelated to the Project) are not within the purview of this arrangement.

An employee covered by this arrangement, who is not dismissed, displaced or otherwise worsened in his position with regard to his employment as a result of the Project, but who is dismissed, displaced or otherwise worsened solely because of the total or partial termination of the Project discontinuance of Project services, or exhaustion of Project funding shall not be deemed eligible for a dismissal or displacement allowance within the meaning of paragraphs (6) and (7) of the Model Agreement or applicable provisions of substitute comparable arrangements.

- (2)(a) Where employees of a Recipient are represented for collective bargaining purposes, all Project services provided by that Recipient shall be provided under and in accordance with any collective bargaining agreement applicable to such employees which is then in effect.
- (b) The Recipient or legally responsible party shall provide to all affected employees sixty (60) days notice of intended actions which may result in displacements or dismissals or rearrangements of the working forces. In the case of employees represented by a union, such notice shall be provided by certified mail through their representatives. The notice shall contain a full and adequate statement of the proposed changes, and an estimate of the number of employees affected by the intended changes, and the number and classifications of any jobs in the Recipient's employment available to be filled by such affected employees.
- (c) The procedures of this subparagraph shall apply to cases where notices involve employees represented by a union for collective bargaining purposes. At the request of either the Recipient or the representatives of such employees, negotiations for the purposes of reaching agreement with respect to the application of the terms and conditions of this arrangement shall commence immediately. If no agreement is reached within twenty (20) days from the commencement of negotiations, any party to the dispute may submit the matter to dispute settlement procedures in accordance with paragraph (4) of this warranty. The foregoing procedures shall be complied with and carried out prior to the institution of the intended action.
- (3) For the purpose of providing the statutory required protections including those specifically mandated by Section 5333(b) of the Act,\* the Public Body will assure as a condition of the release of funds that the Recipient agrees to be bound by the terms and conditions of the National (Model) Section 5333(b) Agreement executed July 23, 1975, identified below, \*\* provided that other comparable arrangements may be substituted therefore, if approved by the Secretary of Labor and certified for inclusion in these conditions.
- (4) Any dispute or controversy arising regarding the application, interpretation, or enforcement of any of the provisions of this arrangement which cannot be settled by and between the parties at interest within thirty (30) days after the dispute or controversy first arises, may be referred by any such party to any final and binding disputes settlement

procedure acceptable to the parties, or in the event they cannot agree upon such procedure, to the U. S. Department of Labor or an impartial third party designated by the U. S. Department of Labor for final and binding determination. The compensation and expenses of the impartial third party, and any other jointly incurred expenses, shall be borne equally by the parties to the proceeding and all other expenses shall be paid by the party incurring them.

In the event of any dispute as to whether or not a particular employee was affected by the Project, it shall be his obligation to identify the Project and specify the pertinent facts of the Project relied upon. It shall then be the burden of either the Recipient or other party legally responsible for the application of these conditions to prove that factors other than the Project affected the employees. The claiming employee shall prevail if it is established that the Project had an effect upon the employee even if other factors may also have affected the employee.

- (5) The Recipient or other legally responsible party designated by the Public Body will be financially responsible for the application of these conditions and will make the necessary arrangements so that any employee covered by these arrangements, or the union representative of such employee may file claim of violation of these arrangements with the Recipient within sixty (60) days of the date he is terminated or laid off as a result of the Project, or within eighteen (18) months of the date his position with respect to his employment is otherwise worsened as a result of the Project. In the latter case, if the events giving rise to the claim have occurred over an extended period, the eighteen (18) month limitation shall be measured from the last such event. No benefits shall be payable for any period prior to six (6) months from the date of the filing of any claim.
- (6) Nothing in this arrangement shall be construed as depriving any employee of any rights or benefits which such employee may have under existing employment or collective bargaining agreements, nor shall this arrangement be deemed a waiver of any rights of any union or of any represented employee derived from any other agreement or provision of federal, state or local law.
- (7) In the event any employee covered by these arrangements is terminated or laid off as a result of the Project, he shall be granted priority of employment or reemployment to fill any vacant position within the control of the Recipient for which he is, or by training or retraining within a reasonable period, can became qualified. In the event training or retraining is required by such employment or reemployment, the Recipient or other legally responsible party designated by the Public Body shall provide or provide for such training or retraining at no cost to the employee.
- (8) The Recipient will post, in a prominent and accessible place, a notice stating that the Recipient has received federal assistance under the Federal Transit Act and has agreed to comply with the provisions of Section 5333(b) of the Act. This notice shall also specify the terms and conditions set forth herein for the protection of employees. The Recipient shall maintain and keep on file all relevant books and records in sufficient detail as to provide the basic information necessary to the proper application, administration, and enforcement of these arrangements and to the proper determination of any claims arising thereunder.

- (9) Any labor organization which is the collective bargaining representative of employees covered by these arrangements, may become a party to these arrangements by serving written notice its desire to do so upon the Recipient and the U. S. Department of Labor. In the event of any disagreement that such labor organization represents covered employees, or is otherwise eligible to become a party to these arrangements, as applied to the Project, the dispute as to whether such organization shall participate shall be determined by the Secretary of Labor.
- (10) In the event the Project is approved for assistance under the Act, the foregoing terms and conditions shall be made part of the contract of assistance between the federal government and the Public Body or Recipient of federal funds; provided, however, that this arrangement shall not merge into the contract of assistance, but shall be independently binding and enforceable by and upon the parties thereto, and by any covered employee or his representative, in accordance with its terms, nor shall any other employee protective agreement merge into this arrangement, but each shall be independently binding and enforceable by and upon the parties thereto, in accordance with its terms.

#### C. Waiver

As a part of the grant approval process, either the Recipient or other legally responsible party designated by the Public Body may in writing seek from the Secretary of Labor a waiver of the statutory required protections. The Secretary will waive these protections in cases, where at the time of the requested waiver, the Secretary determines that there are no employees of the Recipient or of any other surface public transportation providers in the transportation service area who could be potentially affected by the Project. A thirty (30) day notice of proposed waiver will be given by the U. S. Department of Labor and in the absence of timely objection, the waiver will become final at the end of the thirty (30) day notice period. In the event of timely objection, the U. S. Department of Labor will review the matter and determine whether a waiver shall be granted. On the absence of waiver, these protections shall apply to the Project.

#### Notes:

\* Such protective arrangements shall include, without being limited to such provisions as may be necessary for (1) the preservation of rights, privileges, and benefits (including continuation of pension rights and benefits) -under existing collective bargaining agreements or otherwise; (2) the continuation of collective bargaining rights; (3) the protection of individual employees against a worsening of their positions with respect to their employment; (4) assurances of employment to employees of acquired mass transportation systems and priority of reemployment of employees terminated or laid off; and (5) paid training and retraining programs. Such arrangements shall include provisions protecting individual employees against a worsening of their positions with respect to their employment which shall

in no event provide benefits less than those established pursuant to Section 5(2)(f) of the Act of February 4, 1987 (24 Stat. 379), as amended. \*\* For purposes of this warranty arrangement, paragraphs (1); (2); (5); (15); (22); (23); (24); (26); (27); (28); and (29) of the Model Section 5333(b) Agreement, executed July 23, 1975 are to be omitted. The Subrecipient also understands and agrees that these certifications and assurances are special pre-award requirements specifically prescribed by Federal law or regulation and do not encompass all Federal laws, regulations, and directives that may apply to the Subrecipient or its project. Each Subrecipient of FTA assistance awarded to NCDOT and each Subrecipient of State assistance must provide all assurances in this Category "01." NCDOT may not award any State or Federal assistance until the Applicant provides the following assurances by selecting Category "01."

The Applicant agrees that it is under a continuing obligation to comply with the terms and conditions of the grant agreement or cooperative agreement issued for its approved project with NCDOT for FTA. The Applicant recognizes that Federal laws and regulations may be modified from time to time and those modifications may affect project implementation. The Applicant understands

that Presidential executive orders and Federal directives, including Federal policies and program guidance may be issued concerning matters affecting the Applicant or its project. The Applicant agrees that the most recent Federal laws, regulations, and directives will apply to the project, unless FTA issues a written determination otherwise.

#### C. Intergovernmental Review Assurance

Except if the Applicant is an Indian tribal government seeking assistance authorized by 49 U.S.C 5311(c) (1), the Applicant assures that each application for Federal assistance it submits to FTA has been or will be submitted for intergovernmental review to the appropriate State and local agencies as determined by the State.   - (e) The Drug Abuse Office and Treatment Act of 1972, as amended, 21 U.S.C. 1101 et seq., relating to nondiscrimination on the basis of drug abuse;
  - (f) The Comprehensive Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism Prevention Act of 1970, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 4541 et seq. relating to nondiscrimination on the basis of alcohol abuse or alcoholism;

- (a) The Applicant will adequately inform each affected person of the benefits, policies, and procedures provided for in 49 CFR part 24;
- (b) The Applicant will provide fair and reasonable relocation payments and assistance as required by 42 U.S.C. 4622, 4623, and 4624; 49 CFR part 24; and any applicable FTA procedures, to or for families, individuals, partnerships, corporations, or associations displaced as a result of any project financed with FTA assistance;
- (c) The Applicant will provide relocation assistance programs offering the services described in 42 U.S.C. 4625 to such displaced families, individuals, partnerships, corporations, or associations in the manner provided in 49 CFR part 24;

- (7) To the extent applicable, will comply with the Davis-Bacon Act, as amended, 40 U.S.C. 3141 et seq., the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act, as amended, 18 U.S.C. 874, and the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, as amended, 40 U.S.C. 3701 et seq., regarding labor standards for federally assisted projects;
- (8) To the extent applicable, will comply with the flood insurance purchase requirements of section 102(a) of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 4012a(a), requiring the Applicant and its subrecipients in a special flood hazard area to participate in the program and purchase flood insurance if the total cost of insurable construction and acquisition is \$10,000 or more;
- (9) To the extent applicable, will comply with the Lead-Based Paint Poisoning Prevention Act, 42 U.S.C. 4831(b), which prohibits the use of lead-based paint in the construction or rehabilitation of residence structures;
- (10) To the extent applicable, will not dispose of, modify the use of, or change the terms of the real property title or other interest in the site and facilities on which a construction project supported with FTA assistance takes place without permission and instructions from FTA;
- (11) To the extent required by FTA, will record the Federal interest in the title of real property, and will include a covenant in the title of real property acquired in whole or in part with Federal assistance funds to assure nondiscrimination during the useful life of the project;
- (12) To the extent applicable, will comply with FTA provisions concerning the drafting, review, and approval of construction plans and specifications of any construction project supported with FTA assistance. As required by U.S. DOT regulations, "Seismic Safety," 49 CFR 41.117(d), before accepting delivery of any building

- financed with FTA assistance, it will obtain a certificate of compliance with the seismic design and construction requirements of 49 CFR part 41;
- (13) To the extent applicable, will provide and maintain competent and adequate engineering supervision at the construction site of any project supported with FTA assistance to ensure that the complete work conforms with the approved plans and specifications, and will furnish progress reports and such other information as may be required by FTA or the state;
- (14) To the extent applicable, will comply with any applicable environmental standards that may be prescribed to implement the following Federal laws and executive orders:
  - (a) Institution of environmental quality control measures under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 4321 through 4335 and Executive Order No. 11514, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 4321 note;
  - (b) Notification of violating facilities pursuant to Executive Order No. 11738, 42 U.S.C. 7606 note;
  - (c) Protection of wetlands pursuant to Executive Order No. 11990, 42 U.S.C. 4321 note;
  - (d) Evaluation of flood hazards in floodplains in accordance with Executive Order No. 11988, 42 U.S.C. 4321 note;
  - (e) Assurance of project consistency with the approved state management program developed pursuant to the requirements of the Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972, as amended, 16 U.S.C. 1451 through 1465;
  - (f) Conformity of Federal actions to State (Clean Air) Implementation Plans under section 176(c) of the Clean Air Act of 1955, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 7401 through 7671q;
  - (g) Protection of underground sources of drinking water under the Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 300f through 300j-6;
  - (h) Protection of endangered species under the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended, 16 U.S.C. 1531 through 1544; and
  - (i) Environmental protections for Federal transportation programs, including, but not limited to, protections for parks, recreation areas, or wildlife or waterfowl refuges of national, state, or local significance or any land from a historic site of national, State, or local significance to be used in a transportation project as required by 49 U.S.C. 303(b) and 303(c);
  - (j) Protection of the components of the national wild and scenic rivers systems, as required under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1968, as amended, 16 U.S.C. 1271 through 1287; and
  - (k) Provision of assistance to FTA in complying with section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended, 16 U.S.C. 470f; with the Archaeological and Historic Preservation Act of 1974, as amended, 16 U.S.C. 469 through 469c; and with Executive Order No. 11593 (identification and protection of historic properties), 16 U.S.C. 470 note;
- (15) To the extent applicable, will comply with the requirements of the Hatch Act, 5 U.S.C. 1501 through 1508 and 7324 through 7326, which limit the political activities of State and local agencies and their officers and employees whose primary employment activities are financed in whole or part with Federal funds including a Federal loan, grant agreement, or cooperative agreement except, in accordance with 49 U.S.C. 5307(k)(2) and 23 U.S.C. 142(g), the Hatch Act does not apply to a nonsupervisory employee of a public transportation system (or of any other agency or entity performing related functions) receiving FTA assistance to whom that Act does not otherwise apply;
- (16) To the extent applicable, will comply with the National Research Act, Pub. L. 93-348, July 12, 1974, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 289 et seq., and U.S. DOT regulations, "Protection of Human Subjects," 49 CFR part 11, regarding the protection of human subjects involved in research, development, and related activities supported by Federal assistance;
- (17) To the extent applicable, will comply with the Laboratory Animal Welfare Act of 1966, as amended, 7 U.S.C. 2131 et seq., and U.S. Department of Agriculture regulations, "Animal Welfare," 9 CFR subchapter A, parts 1, 2, 3, and 4, regarding the care, handling, and treatment of warm blooded animals held or used for research, teaching, or other activities supported by Federal assistance;
- (18) Will have performed the financial and compliance audits as required by the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996, 31 U.S.C. 7501 et seq., OMB Circular A-133, "Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations," Revised, and the most recent applicable OMB A-133 Compliance Supplement provisions for the U.S. DOT; and
- (19) To the extent applicable, will comply with all applicable provisions of all other Federal laws, regulations, and directives governing the project, except to the extent that FTA has expressly approved otherwise in writing.

#### 02. LOBBYING CERTIFICATION

An Applicant that submits an application to NCDOT for State or (FTA) Federal assistance exceeding \$100,000 is required to provide the following certification. NCDOT may not award State or Federal assistance exceeding \$100,000 until the Applicant provides this certification by selecting Category "02."

- A. As required by 31 U.S.C. 1352 and U.S. DOT regulations, "New Restrictions on Lobbying," at 49 CFR 20.110, the Applicant's authorized representative certifies to the best of his or her knowledge and belief that for each application to FTA for Federal assistance exceeding \$100,000:
  - (1) No Federal appropriated funds have been or will be paid by or on behalf of the Applicant to any person to influence or attempt to influence an officer or employee of any Federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress regarding the award of Federal assistance, or the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal assistance agreement; and
  - (2) If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been or will be paid to any person to influence or attempt to influence an officer or employee of any Federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with any application for Federal assistance, the Applicant assures that it will complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," including information required by the instructions accompanying the form, which form may be amended to omit such information as authorized by 31 U.S.C. 1352.
  - (3) The language of this certification shall be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, subagreements, contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements).
- B. The Applicant understands that this certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance is placed by the Federal Government and that submission of this certification is a prerequisite for providing Federal assistance for a transaction covered by 31 U.S.C. 1352. The Applicant also understands that any person who fails to file a required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.

#### 03. PROCUREMENT COMPLIANCE

In accordance with 49 CFR 18.36(g)(3)(ii), each Applicant that is a State, local, or Indian tribal government that submits an application to NCDOT for State or (FTA) Federal assistance to acquire property or services in support of its project is requested to provide the following certification by selecting Category "03." NCDOT also requests other Applicants to provide the following certification. NCDOT may not provide State or Federal assistance to an applicant for Federal assistance, property or services in support of its project until the Applicant provides this certification by selecting Category "03."

The Applicant certifies that its procurements and procurement system will comply with all applicable third party procurement provisions of Federal laws, regulations, and directives.

#### 04. PRIVATE PROVIDERS OF PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

Each Applicant, that submits and application to NCDOT for State or Federal assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 to acquire any property or an interest in the property of a private provider of public transportation or to operate public transportation equipment or facilities in competition with, or in addition to, transportation service provided by an existing private provider of public transportation is required to provide the following certification. NCDOT may not provide State or Federal assistance for such a project until the Applicant provides this certification by selecting Category "04."

As required by 49 U.S.C. 5323(a)(1), the Applicant certifies that before it acquires the property or an interest in the

property of a private provider of public transportation or operates public transportation equipment or facilities in competition with, or in addition to, transportation service provided by an existing public transportation company, it has or will have:

- A. Determined that the assistance is essential to carrying out a program of projects as required by 49 U.S.C. 5303, 5304, and 5306;
- B. Provided for the participation of private companies engaged in public transportation to the maximum extent feasible: and
- C. Paid just compensation under state or local law to the company for any franchise or property acquired.

#### 05. PUBLIC HEARING

An Applicant seeking State or Federal assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 for a capital project that will substantially affect a community or a community's public transportation service is required to provide the following certification. NCDOT may not award State or Federal assistance for that type of project until the Applicant provides this certification by selecting Category "05."

As required by 49 U.S.C. 5323(b), the Applicant certifies that it has, or before submitting its application, it will have:

- A. Provided an adequate opportunity for public review and comment on the project preceded by adequate prior public notice of the proposed project, including a concise description of the proposed project, published in a newspaper of general circulation in the geographic area to be served;
- B. Held a public hearing on the project if the project affects significant economic, social, or environmental interests after providing adequate notice as described above;
- C. Considered the economic, social, and environmental effects of the proposed project; and
- D. Determined that the proposed project is consistent with official plans for developing the urban area.

#### 06. ACQUISITION OF ROLLING STOCK

An Applicant seeking State or Federal assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 to acquire any rolling stock is required to provide the following certification. NCDOT may not award any State or Federal assistance to acquire such rolling stock until the Applicant provides this certification by selecting Category "06."

As required by 49 U.S.C. 5323(m) and implementing FTA regulations at 49 CFR 663.7, the Applicant certifies that it will comply with the requirements of 49 CFR part 663 as modified by amendments authorized by section 3023(k) of SAFETEA-LU when procuring revenue service rolling stock. Among other things, the Applicant agrees to conduct or cause to be conducted the requisite pre-award and post-delivery reviews, and maintain on file the certifications required by 49 CFR part 663, subparts B, C, and D.

#### 07. ACQUISITION OF CAPITAL ASSETS BY LEASE

An Applicant that requests the use of State or Federal assistance to acquire capital assets by lease is required to provide the following certifications. NCDOT may not provide State or Federal assistance to support those costs until the Applicant provides this certification by selecting Category "07."

As required by FTA regulations, "Capital Leases," at 49 CFR 639.15(b)(1) and 639.21, if the Applicant acquires any capital asset by lease financed with Federal assistance authorized for 49 U.S.C. chapter 53, the Applicant certifies as follows:

- (1) It will not use Federal assistance authorized to finance the cost of leasing any capital asset until it performs calculations demonstrating that leasing the capital asset would be more cost-effective than purchasing or constructing a similar asset; and It will complete these calculations before entering into the lease or before receiving a capital grant for the asset, whichever is later; and
- (2) It will not enter into a capital lease for which FTA can provide only incremental Federal assistance unless it

has adequate financial resources to meet its future obligations under the lease if Federal assistance is not available for capital projects in the subsequent years.

#### 08. BUS TESTING

An Applicant for State or Federal assistance appropriated or made available for 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 to acquire any new bus model or any bus model with a new major change in configuration or components is required to provide the following certification. NCDOT may not provide State or Federal assistance for the acquisition of any new bus model or bus model with a major change until the Applicant provides this certification by selecting Category "08."

As required by 49 U.S.C. 5318 and FTA regulations, "Bus Testing," at 49 CFR 665.7, the Applicant certifies that, before expending any Federal assistance to acquire the first bus of any new bus model or any bus model with a new major change in configuration or components, or before authorizing final acceptance of that bus (as described in 49 CFR part 665), the bus model:

- A. Will have been tested at FTA's bus testing facility; and
- B. Will have received a copy of the test report prepared on the bus model.

#### 09. CHARTER SERVICE AGREEMENT

An Applicant seeking State or Federal assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 (except 49 U.S.C. 5310, 5316, or 5317), or under 23 U.S.C. 133 or 142 to acquire or operate any public transportation equipment or facilities is required to enter into the following Charter Service Agreement. NCDOT may not provide State or Federal assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 (except 49 U.S.C. 5310, 5316, or 5317), or under 23 U.S.C.133 or 142 for such projects until the Applicant enters into this Charter Service Agreement by selecting Category "09."

- A. As required by 49 U.S.C. 5323(d) and (g) and FTA regulations, "Charter Service," at 49 CFR 604.7, the Applicant agrees that it and each subrecipient and third party contractor at any tier:
  - (1) May provide charter service that uses equipment or facilities acquired with Federal assistance authorized under the Federal transit laws (except 49 U.S.C. 5310 5316, or 5317), or under 23 U.S.C. 133 or 142 only in compliance with those laws and FTA regulations, "Charter Service" 49 CFR part 604, the terms and condition of which are incorporated herein by reference.
  - (2) Will comply with the requirements of 49 CFR part 604 before providing any charter service using equipment or facilities acquired with Federal assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 (except 49 U.S.C. 5310, 5316, or 5317), or under 23 U.S.C. 133 or 142 for transportation projects.
- B. The Applicant understands and agrees that:
  - (1) The requirements of 49 CFR part 604 will apply to any charter service it or its subrecipients, lessees, or third party contractors provide,
  - (2) The definitions of 49 CFR part 604 will apply to this Charter Service Agreement, and
  - (3) A violation of this Charter Service Agreement may require corrective measures and imposition of penalties, including debarment from the receipt of further Federal assistance for transportation.

#### 10. SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION AGREEMENT

An Applicant that is seeking State or Federal assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 or under 23 U.S.C.133 or 142 to acquire or operate public transportation facilities and equipment is required to enter into the following School Transportation Agreement. NCDOT may not provide State or Federal assistance for such projects until the Applicant enters into this agreement by selecting Category "10."

- A. As required by 49 U.S.C. 5323(f) and (g) and FTA regulations at 49 CFR 605.14, the Applicant agrees that it and each subrecipient or third party contractor at any tier:
  - (1) May engage in school transportation operations in competition with private school transportation

- operators only to the extent permitted by 49 U.S.C. 5323(f) and (g), Federal regulations;
- (2) Will comply with the requirements of 49 CFR part 605 before providing any school transportation using equipment or facilities acquired with Federal assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 or under 23 U.S.C. 133 or 142 for transportation projects.
- B. The Applicant understands that:
  - (1) The requirements of 49 CFR part 605 will apply to any school transportation service it or its subrecipients or third party contractors provide,
  - (2) The definitions of 49 CFR part 605 will apply to this School Transportation Agreement, and
  - (3) A violation of this School Transportation Agreement may require corrective measures and imposition of penalties, including debarment from the receipt of further Federal assistance for transportation.

#### 11. DEMAND RESPONSIVE SERVICE

An Applicant that operates demand responsive service and applies for State or Federal assistance authorized for 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 to acquire non-rail public transportation vehicles is required to provide the following certification. NCDOT may not award State or Federal assistance authorized for 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 to an Applicant that operates demand responsive service to acquire non-rail public transportation vehicles until the Applicant provides this certification by selecting Category "11"

As required by U.S. DOT regulations, "Transportation Services for Individuals with Disabilities (ADA)," at 49 CFR 37.77(d), the Applicant certifies that its demand responsive service offered to individuals with disabilities, including individuals who use wheelchairs, is equivalent to the level and quality of service offered to individuals without disabilities. When the Applicant's service is viewed in its entirety, the Applicant's service for individuals with disabilities is provided in the most integrated setting feasible and is equivalent with respect to: (1) response time, (2) fares, (3) geographic service area, (4) hours and days of service, (5) restrictions on trip purpose, (6) availability of information and reservation capability, and (7) constraints on capacity or service availability.

#### 12. ALCOHOL MISUSE AND PROHIBITED DRUG USE

An Applicant is required to provide the following certification concerning its activities to prevent alcohol misuse and prohibited drug use in its public transportation operations. NCDOT may not provide State or Federal assistance to the Applicant until it provides this certification by selecting Category "12"

As required by FTA regulations, "Prevention of Alcohol Misuse and Prohibited Drug Use in Transit Operations," at 49 CFR part 655, subpart I, the Applicant certifies that it has established and implemented an alcohol misuse and anti-drug program, and has complied with or will comply with all applicable requirements of FTA regulations, "Prevention of Alcohol Misuse and Prohibited Drug Use in Transit Operations," 49 CFR part 655.

#### 13. INTELLIGENT TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS

Each Applicant that submits an application to NCDOT for State or Federal assistance for an Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) project, defined as any project that in whole or in part finances the acquisition of technologies or systems of technologies that provide or significantly contribute to the provision of one or more ITS user services as defined in the "National ITS Architecture" is requested to provide the following assurance. NCDOT strongly encourages any Applicant for State or Federal financial assistance to support an ITS project to provides this assurance by selecting Category "13." An Applicant for State or Federal assistance for an ITS project that fails to provide this assurance, without providing other documentation assuring the Applicant's commitment to comply with applicable ITS standards and protocols, may be determined ineligible for award of State or Federal assistance for the ITS project.

As used in this assurance, the term Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) project is defined to include any project that in whole or in part finances the acquisition of technologies or systems of technologies that provide or

significantly contribute to the provision of one or more ITS user services as defined in the "National ITS Architecture."

- A. As provided in SAFETEA-LU section 5307(c), 23 U.S.C. 512 note, "the Secretary shall ensure that intelligent transportation system projects carried out using funds made available from the Highway Trust Fund, including funds made available under this subtitle to deploy intelligent transportation system technologies, conform to the national architecture, applicable standards or provisional standards, and protocols developed under subsection (a)." To facilitate compliance with SAFETEA-LU section 5307(c), 23 U.S.C. 512 note, the Applicant assures it will comply with all applicable provisions of Section V (Regional ITS Architecture) and Section VI (Project Implementation) of FTA Notice, "FTA National ITS Architecture Policy on Transit Projects," at 66 FR 1455 et seq., January 8, 2001, and other FTA policies that may be issued in connection with any ITS project it undertakes financed with funds authorized under Title 49 or Title 23, United States Code, except to the extent that FTA expressly determines otherwise in writing.
- B. With respect to any ITS project financed with Federal assistance derived from a source other than Title 49 or Title 23, United States Code, the Applicant assures that it will use its best efforts to ensure that any ITS project it undertakes will not preclude interface with other intelligent transportation systems in the Region.

# 14. ELDERLY INDIVIDUALS AND INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES FORMULA PROGRAM AND PILOT PROGRAM

The North Carolina Department of Transportation administers the Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities Formula Program and, if applicable, the Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities Pilot Program on behalf itself and its subrecipients and is required to provide the following certifications on behalf of itself and each subrecipient. NCDOT may not award assistance for the Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities Formula Program or the Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities Pilot Program until the Applicant provides these certifications by selecting Category "14."

- A. As required by 49 U.S.C. 5310(d), which makes the requirements of 49 U.S.C. 5307 applicable to the Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities Formula Program to the extent that the Federal Transit Administrator or his or her designee determines appropriate, and 49 U.S.C. 5307(d)(1), the State or State organization serving as the Applicant (NCDOT) and that administers, on behalf of the State, the Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities Program authorized by 49 U.S.C. 5310, and, if applicable, the Elderly Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities Pilot Program authorized by subsection 3012(b) of SAFETEA-LU, 49 U.S.C. 5310 note, certifies and assures on behalf of itself and its subrecipients and requires its subrecipients to certify and assure as follows:
  - (1) In compliance with 49 U.S.C. 5307(d)(1)(A), the Applicant has or will have the legal, financial, and technical capacity to carry out its proposed program of projects, including safety and security aspects of that program;
  - (2) In compliance with 49 U.S.C. 5307(d)(1)(B), the Applicant has or will have satisfactory continuing control over the use of project equipment and facilities;
  - (3) In compliance with 49 U.S.C. 5307(d)(1)(C), the Applicant will adequately maintain the project equipment and facilities;
  - (4) In compliance with 49 U.S.C. 5307(d)(1)(E), the Applicant, in carrying out a procurement financed with Federal assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. 5310 or subsection 3012(b) of SAFETEA-LU: (1) will use competitive procurement (as defined or approved by the Secretary), (2) will not use exclusionary or discriminatory specifications in its procurements, (3) will comply with applicable Buy America laws, and (4) will comply with the general provisions for FTA assistance of 49 U.S.C. 5323 and the third party procurement requirements of 49 U.S.C. 5325;
  - (5) In compliance with 49 U.S.C. 5307(d)(1)(G), the Applicant has or will have available and will provide the amount of funds required by 49 U.S.C. 5310(c), and if applicable by section 3012b(3) and (4), for the local share, and that those funds will be provided from approved non-Federal sources except as permitted by Federal law; and
  - (6) In compliance with 49 U.S.C. 5307(d)(1)(H), the Applicant will comply with: 49 U.S.C. 5301(a) (requirements for public transportation systems that maximize the safe, secure, and efficient mobility of individuals, minimize environmental impacts, and minimize transportation-related fuel consumption and

reliance on foreign oil); 49 U.S.C. 5301(d) (special efforts to design and provide public transportation for elderly individuals and individuals with disabilities); and 49 U.S.C. 5303 through 5306 (planning and private enterprise requirements);

- B. The Applicant assures that either it is recognized under State law as a private nonprofit organization with the legal capability to contract with the State to carry out the proposed project, or it is a public body that has met the statutory requirements to receive Federal assistance authorized for 49 U.S.C. 5310.
- C. The Applicant assures that the transit service provided or offered to be provided by existing public or private transit operators is unavailable, insufficient, or inappropriate to meet the special needs of the elderly and persons with disabilities.
- D. In compliance with 49 U.S.C. 5310(d)(2)(A) and section 3012(b)(2), the Applicant certifies, for a project funded under 49 U.S.C. 5336, that project has been or will have been coordinated with private nonprofit providers of services under 49 U.S.C. 5310, prior to disbursement of funds;
- E. In compliance with 49 U.S.C. 5310(d)(2)(C), the Applicant certifies that allocations to subrecipients of financial assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. 5310 or subsection 3012(b) of SAFETEA-LU will be distributed on a fair and equitable basis; and
- F. In compliance with 49 U.S.C. 5310(d)(2)(B) and Subsection 3012(b)(2) of SAFETEA-LU, the Applicant certifies that: (1) projects for assistance under that program were derived from a locally developed, coordinated public transit-human services transportation plan; and (2) the plan was developed through a process that included representatives of public, private, and nonprofit transportation and human services providers and participation by the public.

#### 15. NONURBANIZED AREA FORMULA PROGRAM FOR STATES

Each Applicant for NonUrbanized Formula Grant Program assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. 5311 and State Assistance is required to provide the following certifications. NCDOT may not award Federal assistance for the NonUrbanized Formal Grant Program or State assistance until the Applicant provides these certifications by selecting Category "15."

The provisions of 49 U.S.C. 5311 establishing the Nonurbanized Area Formula Program do not impose, as a pre-conditions of award, explicit certification or assurance requirements established specifically for that program. Only a State or a State organization acting as the Recipient on behalf of a State (State) may be a direct recipient of Nonurbanized Area Formula Program assistance. Separate certifications and assurances have been established in Category 19 for an Indian tribe that that is an Applicant for Tribal Transit Program assistance authorized by 49 U.S.C. 5311(c)(1).

Before FTA may award Nonurbanized Area Formula Program assistance to a State, the U.S. Secretary of Transportation or his or her designee is required to make the pre-award determinations required by 49 U.S.C. 5311. - H. In compliance with 49 U.S.C. 5311(f), the State will expend not less than fifteen (15) percent of the amounts of Federal assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. 5311 that have been provided to the State to develop and support intercity bus transportation within the State, unless the chief executive officer of the State, or his or her designee, after consultation with affected intercity bus service providers, certifies to the Federal Transit Administrator, apart from these certifications and assurances herein, that the intercity bus service needs of the State are being adequately met.

  - (5) In compliance with 49 U.S.C. 5307(d)(1)(E), the Applicant, in carrying out a procurement financed with Federal assistance authorized under 49 U.S.C. 5316: (1) will use competitive procurement (as defined or approved by the Secretary), (2) will not use exclusionary or discriminatory specifications in its procurements, (3) will comply with applicable Buy America laws, and (4) will comply with the general provisions for FTA assistance of 49 U.S.C. 5323 and the third party procurement requirements of 49 U.S.C. 5325;

Specifically, it: (1) has made available, or will make available, to the public information on the amounts available for the JARC Formula Grant Program, 49 U.S.C. 5316, and

# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

#### SCHOOL PLANNING AND INTERLOCAL COOPERATION

#### Contents

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Section 7.	Effect of MOU	

This Memorandum of Understanding (the "MOU") is entered into this \( \frac{19^{7}}{\text{day}} \) of \( \frac{Novembe.}{2006}, \) by and between the Union County Board of Commissioners (the "County"), the Union County Board of Education (the "Board"), and the Town of \( \frac{Fairview}{Tairview} \) (Town).

WHEREAS, Union County has for the past decade been experiencing rapid growth in population, in part, due to its proximity to the major employment center of Charlotte; and

WHEREAS, this growth, and that which is anticipated, creates a demand for additional school facilities to accommodate the students who reside within new developments; and

**WHEREAS**, the responsibility for planning for and constructing new school facilities lies primarily with the Board, with funding provided by the County; and

WHEREAS, the County, the Board and the Town recognize the need to work together to ensure that new development within Union County occurs at a pace that allows the parties to provide adequate school facilities to serve students generated by such new development; and

WHEREAS, the County and the Board have adopted a 6-year Capital Improvement Plan ("CIP") that attempts to accommodate new growth within their fiscal capacity; and

WHEREAS, the CIP includes the renovation and expansion of existing schools and the construction of twelve (12) new schools; and

WHEREAS, although existing and planned school facilities will have a positive impact on school capacity, these planned facilities will not be adequate to serve projected growth; and

WHEREAS, the parties have worked cooperatively and developed a system wherein school facility needs can be monitored and planned to meet the needs of the citizens of the County; and

WHEREAS, the parties will maintain a CIP that is financially feasible and consistent with reasonable growth rates and patterns countywide; and

WHEREAS, the Board is the "responsible agency" for constructing necessary educational facilities as contemplated by the County's Adequate Public Facilities Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Town is responsible for approving local development under their planning and zoning authority; and

WHEREAS, this MOU will ensure that the adequate public facilities standards applied within the Town are uniform and consistent with the standards enforced in the unincorporated areas of the County and other incorporated areas of the County;

**NOW, THEREFORE**, the parties to this MOU hereby agree as follows:

#### Section 1. Definitions

- A. Unless another meaning is specified by this section, the terms used in this MOU shall have the meaning as set forth in the County APFO (defined in subsection B, below), which document is hereby incorporated by this reference.
- B. For purposes of this MOU, certain terms and words are defined as follows:

<u>APFO Administrator</u>: the person, agency or official who is charged with the duty and responsibility to administer the APFO on behalf of the County, the Town, and the Board pursuant to § 5.A of this MOU.

Board: the Union County Board of Education.

Board of Commissioners: the Union County Board of Commissioners.

County: Union County, North Carolina.

<u>County APFO</u>: the Union County Adequate Public Facilities Ordinance, Article XXIII of the Union County Land Use Ordinance.

<u>Permit</u>: any subdivision plat that includes more than five residential lots, conditional use permit, special use permit, major development permit, rezoning, site plan, conditional use zoning district, or equivalent action that authorizes a residential use as established in the Town APFO.

Town: the Town of Fairview (Town), North Carolina.

<u>Town APFO</u>: an ordinance adopted by the governing body of the Town that implements this MOU, supplements the MOU with any procedures and standards required by the Town for processing Permits, and that may incorporate the County APFO by reference.

#### Section 2. Development Standards

- A. The parties hereby agree that the level of service (LOS) standard, including the criteria for mitigation, impact areas, reservation of capacity, determining the impacts of development, and how to measure available capacity are as established in the County APFO.
- B. The parties agree that, for the purposes of this MOU, the Board, in its sound discretion, may establish assumptions and parameters with respect to such matters as school enrollment, attendance zones (i.e. APF subareas), rated capacity, existing and projected demand, and student generation rates. Nonetheless, the parties will coordinate on these matters to ensure consistency between the assumptions and parameters established by the Board, the land use planning policies and standards established by the Town and the County, and Town APFO, and the County APFO.

#### Section 3. Capital Improvement Plan (CIP)

- A. The parties agree to work cooperatively to maintain a financially feasible Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for the construction of schools countywide to meet projected demand based on the adopted level of service herein.
- B. The Board will use its best efforts to construct new schools and permanent expansions to existing schools in accordance with the CIP and adopted level of service standards, taking into account the overall demand for new schools as reflected in applications for residential development in incorporated and unincorporated Union County.
- C. The County will use its best efforts to provide the funding to carry out the CIP.

#### Section 4. Coordination on CIP and Assumptions

On at least an annual basis, the parties' designees will coordinate in the development of the school CIP and the assumptions set forth above such that the objectives of this MOU and the Town APFO and County APFO related to school capacity are achieved and that sufficient school capacity is provided to accommodate new development countywide.

#### Section 5. Administration

- A. The County Planning Director or his designee is designated to serve as the APFO Administrator.
- B. The APFO Administrator will determine whether there is Available Capacity to accommodate development that is authorized by a Permit that is subject to the Town APFO, based on the standards established by the Town APFO, the County APFO, and this MOU.
- C. The Board will determine the Rated Capacity and the Core Capacity for each school and school category consistent with the methodologies prescribed by state law and the County APFO.
- D. Schools, for each school category, will be deemed adequate if there is Available Capacity to accommodate the demand generated by the Proposed Development in accordance with the calculation methodology established in § 371 of the APFO.
- E. The Board, the County and the Town will provide the APFO Administrator all information reasonably requested to assist the APFO Administrator in determining whether there is Available Capacity to support a Proposed Development.
- F. The Town agrees to deny or to attach conditions to any application for a Permit where required by §§ 365 372 of the County APFO. The Town APFO may replace these procedures, or establish additional or supplemental procedures as needed to coordinate the procedures established in this MOU with the Town's procedures and standards for processing a Permit.

#### Section 6. Mitigation

The Board will consider whether to approve any Mitigation that is proposed pursuant to § 367 of the APFO, where an applicant proposes to provide Public Facilities sufficient to mitigate the impact of the Proposed Development on schools. The proposed Mitigation must be established as a condition to the Permit. The County Board of Commissioners may approve a schedule of Voluntary Mitigation Payments that may be proffered by an applicant in lieu of deferring development until facilities are available or adopting a phasing schedule for the development.

#### Section 7. Effect of MOU

The County and Board acknowledge that this MOU is not intended to and does not create legally binding obligations on either party, but, rather, constitutes a good faith statement of the intent of the parties to cooperate in a manner designed to meet the objectives of the

APFO such that the County and Board are able to maintain an acceptable level of service for each school level.

#### Section 8. Indemnification

To the extent permitted by applicable law and to the extent that the Town APFO is no more restrictive than the County APFO, the County agrees to indemnify, save harmless and defend the Town, at the expense of the County, from any and all suits, judgments, costs, damages, claims, demands, actions, causes of action, proceedings, expenses or liabilities of any nature (collectively "claims"), which are threatened or brought against, or are incurred by, the Town to the extent such claims allege that the County APFO is: (i) a regulatory taking; (ii) an illegal exaction; (iii) a deprivation of due process or equal protection; or (iv) an illegal ordinance due to insufficient statutory authority; provided, however, that the County is notified of any such claim promptly in writing. The County shall have the sole control of the defense of any such suit, proceeding or action, and the County, in its sole discretion, shall have the sole right to settle any such suit, proceeding or action.

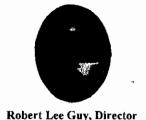

## Monroe Union Ledge #19

The Monroe Union FOP Lodge #19 (The local Fraternal Order of Police lodge, represents all sworn law enforcement officers in Union County - with over 324,000 members in the United States) is building a law enforcement memorial to be displayed at the Judicial Center in Monroe NC.

The memorial will be a 2.5 foot tall candle (grey granite) that will have a blue fiber optic flame (5" tall) that will shine 24 hours a day 365 days a year representing our profession. The candle is solar powered. The candle is a symbol that many law enforcement supporters have displayed in their own homes with a blue light showing their continued appreciation for the law enforcement officers in the community as well as to remember those officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty. Elizabeth Cooke, of the Union County Project Blue Light, as well as a committee member of this memorial, provides these candles to all law enforcement officers in Union County. FOP Lodge # 19 Law Enforcement Memorial Committee thought that this design would be fitting as a lasting memorial to our fallen officers. Union County has been fortunate that only two officers have fallen in the line of duty in Union County. Even though their names are on the National Law Enforcement Memorial in Washington DC, the FOP Lodge # 19 wants a way to honor our local law enforcement officers as well as pay tribute to those who have paid the ultimate sacrifice for the Citizens of Union County. We pray that no other officers will be added to this memorial but have made the design to allow for expansion of the names and a display that honor's their memories (be it a picture of the officer or other chosen design).

The candle and flame will sit atop of a black granite base over 3.5 feet tall. There will be brick sidewalk surrounding the memorial. The FOP Lodge # 19 will sell the bricks to help off set the cost of the memorial. The projected cost of this memorial will be approximately \$30,000 dollars. The Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee along with the Parks and Recreation Department request your endorsement of the PARTF application, and approval of matching funding for the Parks and Recreation Trust Fund (PARTF) Grant, if, Union County is awarded the PARTF Grant for the 2008 cycle. This grant is for Phase I of the Passive Area at Jesse Helms Park and includes infrastructure for this undeveloped area of approximately 150 acres, along with walking/jogging/fitness/bike trails, playgrounds, picnic sites/picnic shelters, horseback trails, horseshoes, and volleyball. This development will complete approximately 50% of the Passive Area.

Parks and Recreation, with Board approval, will be submitting the application in the amount of \$1,111,963. The maximum match, provided with the award of the PARTF Grant is \$500,000, leaving a balance to be funded by Union County of \$611,963. There will also likely be some additional costs involved for planning and contingency that will be addressed in the next budget. The PARTF Grant only permits 10% planning cost and 5% contingency cost. Most Landscape Architectural Firms charge from 12% - 15%, and contingency fees vary depending on the Firm and the project.

Awards could be made as early as May 2008, or as late as July 2008. With that in mind, it could be August/September 2008 before a consultant has been approved and comes on line, as late as November or December before plans have been completed and possibly March 2009 before we break ground. We have included inflationary costs of 3.5% for the planning time involved (approximately one year from the time of award).

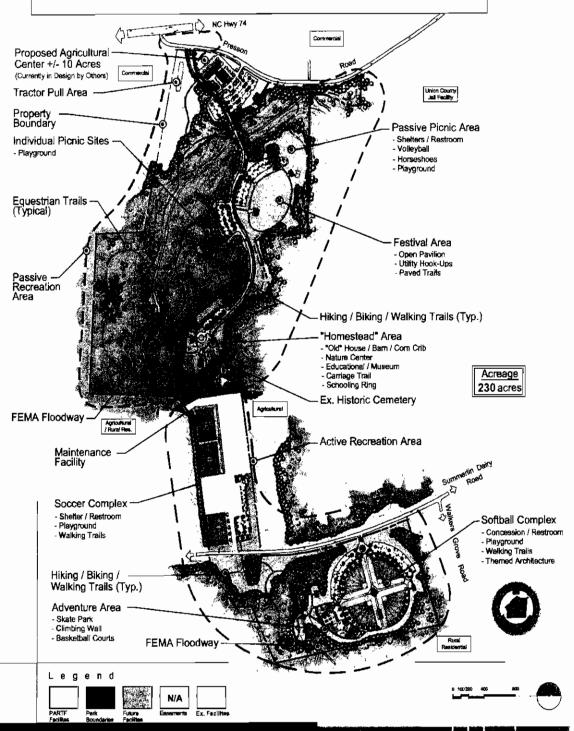
Enclosed is a spreadsheet listing the project elements and the costs projections. Original cost analysis was provided by Woolpert, Inc. A map of the Passive Area is also enclosed for your information. Applications are due to our Consultant with Recreation Resources in Raleigh by January 10, 2008 for an early review, and January 31, 2008 is the deadline for final submittal.

I further request that the Board authorize the Interim County Manager to execute the application for this project, and to execute the agreement if Union County is awarded the 2008 PARTF Grant. # Union County Public Works Self Help Program

## **Program Description**

The program pertains to extension of County-owned water and/or sewer infrastructure by offering financial and construction administration assistance to existing County residents. The program targets, but is not limited to, residents who face an existing or imminent threat to public health or to the environment due to poor water quality, insufficient water supply, or failing septic systems as determined by the Union County Environmental Health Department. Eligible project proposals are submitted during semiannual application periods, as described below. Competing projects are weighted by several criteria and presented to the Board of County Commissioners (Board) for review and selection.

## **Union County Obligations**

Funding from the Water and Sewer Operating Fund for this program is based on the "lifetime value of a customer." The calculation of this contribution is:

(value of a customer\*) x (nbr of participating cust to be served by project)

\* for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2005, the value of a customer is:

Water = \$2,220 Sewer = \$1,410

Examples on page three (3) of this summary demonstrate how UCPW participation may vary.

General Fund contributions for this program are capped at \$200,000 per year, and \$100,000 is allocated for each of the two semiannual application periods. \$2,000 maximum per participating customer to be served may be granted for those projects that are selected. Any unused funding will be added to the available reserves for future Self Help project selections.

The remaining balance of each project's funding will be the responsibility of the applicants.

#### **Project Beneficiaries' Obligations**

Project beneficiaries are expected to:

- 1. Sign a Contract of Participation within 30 days of the Board's selection.
- 2. Pay one-half (1/2) of the applicable funding and fees are to be paid when awards are made and will be held in escrow pending the project's completion. Failure to pay this portion of the funding and fees within 60 days of the selection will nullify the County's agreement to participate. Exception to these payment requirements are set forth below.
- 3. Pay water and/or sewer capacity fees according to the County's Extension Policy at the prevailing rate. All fees must be paid in full prior to

- connection to service lines. Exception to these payment requirements are set forth below.
- 4. Participants must donate any easements necessary to construct the project.
- Understand that costs associated with connection to water meters or the sewer collection system are outside the scope of this program. These are the responsibility of each program recipient. Associated costs may include water sample testing costs, plumbing permits, or plumbing service charges.
- 6. Connect to the appropriate water and/or sewer line within 60 days of the project's completion, upon engineer's certification.
- Begin receiving monthly billings for water and/or sewer service within 90 days of the project's completion. If beneficiary fails to connect to service line within 60 days, base charges only will be billed until connection is completed. Contact UCPW Customer Service staff at 704-296-4210 for current rates.

Exception: If project beneficiaries' Median Household Incomes (MHI) fall below the poverty level, as defined by the US Census Bureau, the County will finance the applicable capacity fees for a period of up to five (5) years at a rate equivalent of five percent (5%) per annum.

## Selection Criteria

Applicants are expected to respond to requests for clarification or additional information in a timely fashion. It is advantageous to the applicant to respond accordingly as points allocation is largely dependent upon the quality and clarity of information provided by the applicant. Any application that does not contain information sufficient to permit review and ranking or contain misrepresentations will not be included in the final recommendations for that funding period.

\* Value of a customer: this is equal to the net present value (NPV) of future cash flows available after paying the variable cost of providing service to an individual customer. The formula is adjusted annually based on the actual costs of the prior year and consumption patterns of an average utility customer.

#### **Definitions**

Public Health Risk: a proposed project shall be necessary to facilitate compliance with the North Carolina Drinking Water Act or the federal Safe Drinking Water Act. Projects may address:

- Acute or imminent health hazards;
- Nitrate, nitrite or fecal coliform MCL violations or contaminant levels in drinking water which constitute acute health risks as defined in 40 C.F.R. 141.32(a)(1)(iii);
- Any contaminant in a public water system that poses an acute risk or imminent hazard to public health as determined by the State Health Director or a health risk assessment from the Division of Epidemiology, Department of Health and Human Services in accordance with G.S. 130A-2(3);
- Or any other public health need related to drinking water identified in the temporary rules 15A NCACJ.0701 as promulgated by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources.

Insufficient Water Supply: recurrent water outages or low pressure situations resulting in violation of 15A NCAC 18C.2001.

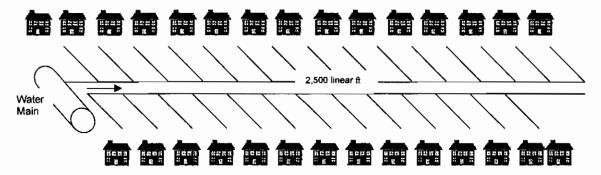
#### Examples

These examples assume that water lines cost \$25 per linear foot. Actual cost will vary by project from this figure, and examples are merely included to depict how the program works and how the parties share project costs. Costs for sewer projects generally run much higher than costs for water projects due to the nature of sewer line extensions.

#### Example 1

At \$25 per linear foot (l.f.), this 2,500 l.f. project costs \$62,500. If 28 customers connect, Union County would pay 100% of the project cost:

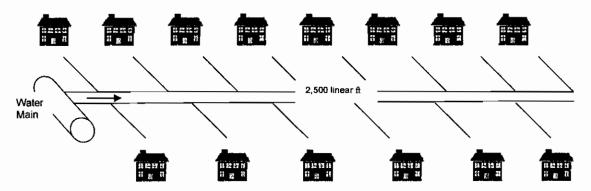
28 customers X \$2,220 per customer = \$62,160



#### Example 2

At \$25 per linear foot (i.f.), this 2,500 l.f. project costs \$62,500. If 14 customers connect, Union County would pay approximately 50% of the project cost or \$31,080. The remainder of the cost would fall to the project applicant(s):

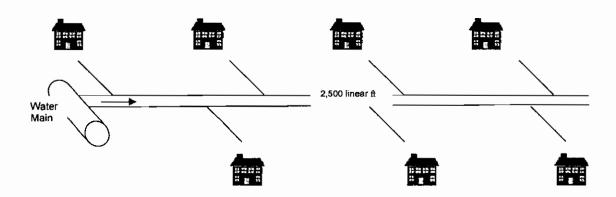
