- The local School Health Advisory Council shall inform and update the public about the content, implementation, evaluation and compliance of the Local Wellness Policy and the Healthy Active Children Policy.

GOAL 1: Expand community awareness regarding substance use disorder and tobacco/vaping use in Union County, NC with a focus on school-aged children within Union County Public Schools.

Objective 1 -

Action Steps

Union County Public Schools and the community will conduct events on various aspects of drug and tobacco use, focusing on the rising use of vaping and substance use disorder among youth.

Methods for Measuring Implementation

- Establish a baseline and monitor trends in UCPS
 Disciplinary Referrals related to drug, tobacco
 & vaping.
- Update UCPS Health Education Curriculum to reflect current trends in substance use and tobacco/vaping.
- Partner with Wingate University Pharmacy
 Department, Union County Health Department,
 and other community resources to provide stakeholder education.
- Collaborate with UCPS school-based leadership to identify opportunities for student, parent, and staff education related to relevant risky teen behaviors, including vaping and substance use.
- Collaborate with secondary UCPS school leadership to identify school-based champions to initiate a variety of initiatives to address the vaping epidemic and insure student support systems are implemented to meet needs.

Objective 1 -

Action Steps

Continue to build relationships among the various Student Support Team members to allow focus on students most in need of compressive services to address mental health and academic engagement needs.

Assigned staff in each school building will be part of the crisis response team.

Methods for Measuring Implementation

- Communication among UCPS cabinet and local school level leadership as well as various team members to focus on the operationalization of the Student Support model at the school level.
- Student support teams at the local school level will meet 1-2 x per month. Student Support Team membership at the school level includes: School Counselors, School Nurse, School Social Worker, School Psychologist, and Mental Health Therapist.
- Expand community partnerships to provide professional mental health services to the UCPS student population, including Atrium Health Teletherapy and the Department of Social Services Behavioral Health Collaborative Program.
- Serve as a resource to all UCPS leadership regarding the focus on building and maintaining healthy social and emotional school climates within each school.
- Implement various aspects of the Threat
 Assessment Plan, Reunification Plan, Suicide
 Intervention Plan. Define the role of members of the crisis response teams.
- Staff will be aware of what team they are a part of and know how to respond based on training provided on protocols.

Policy Changes: NA

Action Plan:

- 1. Research current efforts addressing mental health issues and in Union County. Compile data on all efforts underway.
- 2. Review CHA data related to mental health and access to services.
- 3. Survey clients in treatment or receiving services to gain an understanding of the path they took to engaging in treatment and existing resources (referral, internet, court ordered, schools, family member, Resource Guide, etc.)
- 4. Work with Inmate health to identify mental health trends they see within the jail
- 5. Interview law enforcement to compile data on mental health issues frequently encountered in the community.
- 6. Pull 911 call data related to mental health (suicides, nature codes pertaining to unstable individuals or behaviors).
- 7. Pull Union EMS Data related to mental health calls
- 8. Develop marketing campaign about mental health services / resources
- 9. Train all Human Service Staff members in Mental Health First Aid
- 10. Increase access to training on Suicide Prevention (ASIST)
- 11. Work with Cardinal / Novant Health to create access to Mental Health First Aid
- 12. Identify options for access to Assist suicide Prevention Trainings
- 13. Support suicide related legislation at the state to increase local level education in school settings, increase allowable scope of medical examiners around apparent suicides enabling further investigation.

Related Facts

- Increase in prevalence and increased impact on the community
- Depression, anxiety, 30% increased suicide rate in 18 30 year olds
- Social Media / Electronics decreased social / coping / problem solving skills

Timeline: July 2019: Planning initiated

On-going - 2022



Measurable:

- o Increase knowledge of mental health disorders and services
- o Current comprehensive data on the impacts of mental health on emergency services / first responders
- o Increase of services (target data collection with partners)
- o Decrease use of ED services at hospitals for Mental Health issues
- o Decrease suicide rate in Union County
- o Quantify access to Suicide Prevention Trainings offered (ASIST and QPR)
- o Quantify access to Mental Health First Aid Trainings offered

- Human Services is working on a Wellness Module for all staff, with a particular focus on impacts of work stress on Social Workers, clinical staff and interpreters that deal with stressful, scary and emotional things in daily work

- All Veterans Services staff have been trained in suicide prevention awareness
- Union County Public Schools (UCPS), Atrium Health and Partners Health Management continued to offer Mental Health First Aid courses in the community. Numbers are at the same level as in 2020.
- Union County posted mental health awareness messages on social media and the community e-newsletter (Horizon) on the following topics: world suicide prevention day, minority mental health month, and mental health awareness.
- UCPS launched Start with Hello campaign to bring attention to the growing epidemic of social isolation and to empower young people to create a culture of inclusion and connectedness within their school, youth organization, and community (10 social media posts from Sept. 18-27, 2022); a bullying prevention campaign (six media posts); and an anonymous tip line to report a crisis.
- UCPS has four mental health clubs that meet regularly.
- Partners Health Management provided classes in QPR Suicide Prevention, Mental Health and Substance Use Disorders, and Mental Health 101.

Behavioral Health Collaborative

Union County's Behavioral Health Collaborative, an award-winning partnership between Social Services and UCPS, continued to connect students and their families to social, emotional and behavioral/mental health support, despite restrictions.

- The number of presentations about social and emotional wellness for students, staff and parents increased in 2021 from 2020.
- The number of students served increased in 2021 from 2020.
